The attached report concerns a matter of mutual interest to Miami-Dade County (County) and the Miami-Dade County School Board as it involves a trust fund created by County ordinance for which Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) has been the sole recipient of those funds since inception. As you are aware, the Miami-Dade County Office of the Inspector General (OIG), through an Interlocal Agreement, serves as the OIG for the School Board. Thus, this investigation has dual significance as it involved both political subdivisions that the OIG services.

The County created the Drivers Education Safety Trust Fund (Trust Fund) in 2002 shortly after the Florida Legislature passed the Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act, which allowed county governments to enact local legislation requiring the clerk of the court to collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty. The Trust Fund proceeds are meant to fund traffic education programs in public and non-public schools. Key criteria tied to the distribution of the proceeds is that the funds be used for direct educational expenses; that proceeds be used to enhance the driver education program—not merely subsidize existing driver education program expenses as public schools are already required to teach the curriculum; and that qualifying driver education programs must include a minimum of 30 percent of a student's time behind the wheel. Another County enacted criteria requires that qualifying programs be accessible to public and non-public school students.

The OIG initiated this investigation based on a complaint questioning the legitimacy of M-DCPS' reimbursement requests to the County. The investigation substantiated the allegation and determined that M-DCPS knowingly submitted ineligible expenses for reimbursement. Based on these false and inaccurate descriptions, the County disbursed, and M-DCPS received, \$6.2 million in Trust Fund proceeds that it was not eligible to receive.

This report, as a draft, was provided to the M-DCPS Superintendent for review and comment. The response received from the Deputy Superintendent acknowledges that M-DCPS received reimbursement for ineligible expenses. It also accepts and pledges to implement the OIG's eight recommendations. The response also pledges that M-DCPS "[s]taff will collaborate with Miami-Dade County to restore an effective and accessible driver education program for students in our community and ensure that funds they deem were received through the reimbursement of ineligible expenses will be reinvested back into the [driver education program]."

The OIG acknowledges that accounting for the \$6.2 million financial liability through reinvestment and/or credits will take time to implement. In our recommendations, the OIG also observes that going forward, the disbursement process may need to be restructured to allow for monetary advances that will achieve the goal of true program enhancement. The OIG intends to monitor these progresses, and we will be requesting that the County and M-DCPS administrations notify us of meetings related to the Trust Fund. As it relates to the remaining recommendations solely for the School Board's implementation, we request to be provided with a status report, in 90 days, on or before December 3, 2021.

Lastly, the OIG would like to thank former and current M-DCPS staff for their cooperation during this investigation, and County staff from the Office of Management and Budget for their assistance in gathering records vital to this case. For your reading convenience, a Synopsis begins on page 1 of the report.

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#### I. INTRODUCTION & SYNOPSIS

The Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) Office of the Inspector General (OIG) received a complaint alleging that since 2003, the School Board has received a little more than \$15 million dollars of funding from the *Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act* (Dori Slosberg Act), and the funds were being used improperly. The complainant explained that the funds are generated from an additional \$3.00 added to each traffic citation issued within Miami-Dade County (County) and are supposed to be used for the enhancement of the M-DCPS Driver Education Program (DEP). The complainant also alleged M-DCPS had misrepresented, in an Interlocal Agreement (ILA) with the County, the number of schools that provided both classroom and behind-the-wheel instruction to students, as required by *Florida Statutes* and County Ordinance to receive funds pursuant to the Dori Slosberg Act. In fact, the complainant stated that several schools listed in the ILA, as providing driver education, did not offer any form of driver education at all and only six high schools provided the necessary classroom and behind-the-wheel driving courses taught by certified instructors, as required.

The complainant further alleged that since December 2015, no one has been assigned the responsibility for the "Adaptive Driving Program," which teaches special needs students how to drive, in violation of the *Individuals with Disabilities Education Act* (IDEA).

The OIG investigation substantiated the allegation that M-DCPS knowingly submitted ineligible expenses for reimbursement to the County through the *Drivers Education Safety Trust Fund* County Ordinance 02-167 in support of Section 318.1215, *Florida Statutes*, referred to as the Dori Slosberg Act.<sup>1</sup> M-DCPS OIG Special Agents determined that, by knowingly submitting ineligible expenses to the County, M-DCPS was overpaid \$6,281,814.74. These reimbursements for ineligible expenses were deposited into the M-DCPS general funds account and not used for enhancement of the program. Instead, the funds were used to offset the ineligible expenses while the Driver Education Program deteriorated.

In 2002, the Florida legislature passed the Dori Slosberg Act allowing a board of county commissioners to enact an ordinance requiring the clerk of the court to collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty to be used to fund traffic education programs in public and non-public schools. From its inception, the state required the funds to be used for direct educational expenses and not for administrative expenses.

The statute was further amended to clarify that the funds were to be used for driver education programs in schools for enhancement and not replacement of other driver education program funds. A few years later, the statute was amended to require that a

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minimum of 30 percent of a student's time be behind-the-wheel instruction in order to receive any funds.

The Miami-Dade Board of County Commissioners (BCC) immediately adopted an ordinance known as the *Drivers Education Safety Trust Fund* (*Trust Fund*) and instructed the County's Clerk of the Court to collect the additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty to fund drivers education programs pursuant to the Dori Slosberg Act, Section 318.1215, *Florida Statutes*. For M-DCPS to qualify for funding under this *Trust Fund* it had to meet specific criteria established by this ordinance and County resolutions supporting the ordinance.

Beginning in School Year 2002-2003 through School Year 2007-2008, M-DCPS provided the DEP through the Day School Program.<sup>2</sup> In School Year 2008-2009, the DEP was transferred to the M-DCPS Adult Education Program. The investigation revealed that due to new legislation defunding elective classes offered via co-enrollment in an adult education program,<sup>3</sup> the DEP returned to the Day School Program at the commencement of School Year 2011-2012. This report covers the DEP once it was transferred back to the Day School Program. Once transferred, M-DCPS identified there were 10 high schools with a driving range capable of providing students with the behind-the-wheel requirement.<sup>4</sup> This investigation revealed that although 10 schools had been identified, only six of those schools had working cars and properly certified teachers holding both the required Florida Department of Education (FLDOE) certification with a Driver Education endorsement and the Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV), Driver Education Licensing Assistance Program (DELAP) certification, required to teach the course and administer the examinations for the issuance of a Learner's or Class E driver license.

During the investigation, OIG Special Agents determined that M-DCPS had submitted ineligible expenses to the County claiming that during Fiscal Year (FY) 2011-12, M-DCPS met the qualifying criteria at 36 high schools instead of the six high schools that actually met the criteria. During FY 2012-13 and again during FY 2013-14, M-DCPS claimed 37 high schools met the qualifying criteria, knowing only six high schools qualified. Although M-DCPS claimed expenses for FY 2014-15, again alleging 37 high schools met the qualifying criteria when only six high schools qualified, the County did not advertise the availability of the trust funds and none were awarded. This

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investigation further revealed for FY 2015-16, M-DCPS again submitted their Letter of Interest (LOI) to the County for reimbursement claiming 36 high schools met the qualifying criteria, when only six high schools qualified. The claim for reimbursement was later modified and reduced to three qualifying high schools. (The OIG investigation revealed M-DCPS was still properly operating the DEP at six high schools during FY 2015-16 and thus was actually underpaid.)

The OIG interviewed numerous M-DCPS administrators under oath, including the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) at the time, that signed the LOIs that were sent to the County; the Assistant Chief Budget Officer, who later became the Chief Budget Officer (CBO) and now serves as the CFO; and the Executive Budget Director (who is now the CBO) responsible for drafting and submitting the LOIs and providing the backup documents for the ineligible expenses claimed. The Executive Budget Director admitted to the OIG Special Agents that although M-DCPS claimed reimbursement for its Driver Education Program as if 36 and later 37 high schools were meeting the *Florida Statutes*/County Ordinance mandated requirements, in actuality, only six high schools qualified for reimbursement of its costs for the DEP. The County relied on this false information and entered into numerous ILAs with M-DCPS throughout the period subject of this investigation, ultimately reimbursing M-DCPS over \$8 million when they were only entitled to a fraction of that amount.

Once M-DCPS received those reimbursements, M-DCPS deposited the monies in its general funds account. None of the funds were used to enhance the DEP, which was deteriorating every day with old cars, non-DEP certified teachers, and a minimal number of driving ranges.

The OIG investigation also revealed additional troubling areas of concern not mentioned in the initial complaint, such as M-DCPS failing to provide Adaptive Driver Education services to disabled students since December 2015. The teacher providing the instruction to disabled students retired on November 30, 2015 and was never replaced. Additionally, M-DCPS did not adequately provide Driver Education opportunities for private school students as required by the County ordinance.

#### III. OIG JURISDICTIONAL AUTHORITY

The OIG provides inspector general services to M-DCPS pursuant to an Interlocal Agreement (ILA) between Miami-Dade County and the School Board of Miami-Dade County. The ILA governs the scope and jurisdiction of the OIG's activities. Among the authority, jurisdiction, responsibilities, and functions conferred upon the OIG is the authority and jurisdiction to investigate M-DCPS affairs, including the power to review past, present, and proposed programs, accounts, records, contracts and transactions. The ILA also affords the OIG access to M-DCPS records and provides the OIG with the authority to require reports from the Administration regarding any matter within the jurisdiction of the OIG.

Foremost, however, the OIG serves as Miami-Dade County's independent oversight agency established pursuant to the County's Home Rule Charter and Section 2-1076 of the Code of Miami-Dade County. Oversight of County programs, contracts, and transactions are among the various authorities and powers tasked to the OIG. As this investigation pertains directly to a County program and the resulting annual agreements entered into between the County and M-DCPS, the OIG's responsibility to report on this subject matter to both governmental entities is warranted.

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#### IV. BACKGROUND & GOVERNING AUTHORITIES

In the State of Florida, all school districts are required to make available a course of study and instruction in the safe operation of a motor vehicle to all students in the secondary schools throughout the state. Florida Statutes spell out different options the district school boards may use to accomplish this requirement. These options include utilizing instructional personnel employed by the district, contracting with an appropriately licensed commercial driving school or contracting with a certified instructor. In order to finance these state-mandated courses of study, Florida levies an additional 50 cents per year to the driver license fee required by statutes. This additional fee is required to be promptly remitted to DHSMV, which in turn transmits the fee to the Florida CFO to be deposited in the State's General Revenue Fund.

### Requirements for Teenagers to Obtain a State of Florida Driver License

The State of Florida requires teenagers (ages 15 to 18) to undergo different stages of learning before applying for a restricted driver license a/k/a learner's license and ultimately a Class E Driver License.<sup>7</sup> To obtain a learner's license, teenagers must be at least 15 years old, complete a four-hour Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) Course,<sup>8</sup> and pass the vision and Class E written knowledge exam.<sup>9</sup>

To obtain a Class E Driver License, a teenager must be at least 16 years old, must have completed all the same requirements for a learner's license, and must have held a learner's license for at least 12 months or until he/she turns 18, whichever comes first. In addition, the teenage applicant will need to demonstrate driving proficiency, as well as satisfy other learning requirements including attending a drug and alcohol course. There are four ways a teenager (under the age of 18) can satisfy these requirements.

Under the first option, a teenage driver may undergo a self-study regimen by downloading the *Official Florida Driver License Handbook* (Handbook) available in English, Spanish, and Kreol.<sup>10</sup> The teenager must then register, at a cost, with an approved DHSMV vendor to take the four-hour drug and alcohol course.

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Instead of undergoing a self-study regimen, a second option is to register, at a cost, with a vendor to review the Handbook and take the four-hour drug and alcohol course.

Under options one and two, described above, a teenager must obtain at least 50 hours of behind-the-wheel driving experience by practicing how to drive with a licensed adult over the age of 21. The licensed adult (parent, legal guardian, or other responsible person 21 years old or older) must certify that the teenage applicant has at least 50 hours of behind-the-wheel driving experience, and no moving traffic violation convictions for 12 months from the learner's license date of issue.

A third option, which comes at a high cost to the teenager and parents, is to utilize the services of a private driving school.<sup>11</sup> This option satisfies the behind-the-wheel instructional requirements, the drug and alcohol course, and teaches the *Driver License Handbook*.

Lastly, the fourth option, which is a more comprehensive program and free of charge to students and their parents, is the DEP through their local School District. M-DCPS through its high school-based DEP, provides a valuable service to teenage students and their parents, and to the entire community as well, by educating them on the rules and responsibilities associated with their driving privileges. The DHSMV approved DEP curriculum includes the TLSAE, which reduces the expenses students and their parents would incur if they had to select any of the other options available to them. It further allows students to comply with the school attendance requirement and meet the 50 hours of driving experience required for the driver license. Although students still incur the fees for a driver license, the DEP provides them other cost savings, such as possible insurance discounts, and helps facilitate their completion of the various requirements. The TLSAE would be one example, but perhaps more importantly the DEP facilitates instructor-led driver training in roadworthy vehicles, and completion of their DHSMV written and driving skills exam.

To assist local high schools throughout the State of Florida in delivering standardized driver education programs, the DHSMV developed DELAP, which allows FLDOE certified teachers with mandatory specialized training in approved driver education to teach and administer the Class E driver license exam to minors.<sup>13</sup> Students who

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complete their driver education license exams through approved DELAP courses in public or private schools, will have their results entered into the DHSMV's records systematically or by their driver education teacher. The exam results will be used for the issuance of a learner's or Class E driver license.

### Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act

On February 23, 1996, Dori Slosberg, her twin sister and five other friends, ranging in ages between 13 and 14 years old, got in the back of a Honda Civic, driven by a 19-year old teenager and a 17-year old passenger they had met at a bowling alley. The Florida Highway Patrol reported that the driver reached speeds of approximately 90 MPH in a 50 MPH zone before losing control of the vehicle. The Honda Civic spun out of control, jumping over a median into oncoming traffic and striking an Acura with three occupants heading home from the movies. The accident left seven passengers injured, some critically, and five dead, including Dori Slosberg.

In 2002, State Representative Irv Slosberg introduced Florida House Bill 19 in honor of his late daughter, Dori Slosberg. The Bill would allow a board of county commissioners to require, by ordinance, that the clerk of the court collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty to be used to fund traffic education programs in public and non-public schools. House Bill 19 was passed and became effective October 1, 2002 as the *Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act*. The law is codified in Section 318.1215, *Florida Statutes*.

From its initial passage into law, the statute required that any ordinance adopted, pursuant to the Dori Slosberg Act, provide that the board of county commissioners administer the collected funds. The statute also required the funds to be used for direct educational expenses and not for administrative expenses.

Effective October 1, 2005, the statute was amended to clarify that funds from the *Dori Slosberg Act* be used for enhancement and not replacement of driver education program funds. The restriction that the funds be used for direct educational expenses and not for administrative expenses remained unchanged. The amendment also added that "[e]ach driver education program receiving funds pursuant to this section shall require that a minimum of 30 percent of a student's time in the program be behind-thewheel training." <sup>14</sup>

Effective October 1, 2006, the statute was amended to allow the clerk of the court to collect \$5.00 instead of \$3.00 for each civil traffic penalty.<sup>15</sup>

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#### Miami-Dade County Ordinance 02-167

On September 24, 2002, the BCC passed and adopted County Ordinance 02-167 establishing the *Drivers Education Safety Trust Fund*. Pursuant to Florida Statutes Section 318.1215, the ordinance directed the Miami-Dade Clerk of the Court to collect the additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty, not including parking violations. It also instructed the clerk of the court to deposit the funds into a separate account to financially assist driver education programs in public and non-public schools. It further provided that such funds were to be used for direct educational expenses and were not to be used for administration. Additionally, it ordered the County Manager to develop procedures for the selection of recipients to receive grant funds from the *Drivers Education Safety Trust Fund*.

### V. ADMINISTRATION OF THE TRUST FUND - FROM INCEPTION TO PRESENT

#### County Resolutions Establishing Trust Fund Procedures

On June 3, 2003, the BCC passed and adopted Resolution R-618-03, creating the selection procedures for the distribution of funds from the *Trust Fund*. The County Manager's Recommendation Memorandum, in support of the proposed resolution, stated that upon adoption, the County Manager would "advertise the availability of a grant(s), accept and evaluate applications and appoint a review panel for recommending recipient(s) to the Board of County Commissioners."

Accompanying the Recommendation Memorandum was an attachment that contained the *County Manager Proposed Selection Procedures for the Distribution of the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund.* At its core, the selection procedures required that the grant be awarded to a public school system or not-for-profit private school offering the opportunity to learn to drive. Additionally, the school's curriculum must include behind-the-wheel experience. The criteria also required that the driver education be offered to "private as well as public school students in Miami-Dade County" and that "funds must not be used for administrative/overhead expenses."

Two months later in July 2003, the BCC approved the first grant award from the *Trust Fund*. <sup>19</sup> The grant to M-DCPS was for an amount not to exceed total fund collections for the period October 1, 2002 to September 30, 2003, which was estimated to be approximately \$960,000. The agenda item recommending the award noted that only one grant application was received, pursuant to the County's advertisement of funding availability, and that based on the Clerk of the Courts' projections, collections for FY

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2002-03 will total approximately \$960,000. The resolution required that the School District submit a detailed line item budget and narrative; a detailed plan to offer driver education to private school students; resumes of some of the driving instruction educators; and a plan to comply with programmatic and fiscal reporting requirements, including sample forms. Notably, the agenda item indicated that an advance payment could be made in advance of the close of the fiscal year upon execution of the grant agreement.

The following year, in July 2004, the BCC approved the second grant award from the *Trust Fund*.<sup>20</sup> The grant award to M-DCPS (now referenced as an amendment to the prior year's interlocal agreement [ILA]) was not to exceed the total collections for the period October 1, 2003 to September 30, 2004, estimated to be approximately \$1.1 million. The recommendation adhered to all the documentation requirements established in the prior year's grant award, but also included revised procedures for the grant award going forward. The revised procedures did not alter the criteria for grant qualification, but only added certain procedures to be followed upon receiving grant applications. Noting that upon advertisement, only one application was received—from M-DCPS—that going forward, "If only one letter of interest from a qualified organization is received, then the County Manager, or his designee, will negotiate an agreement and submit it to the Board for approval." (See **Exhibit 1** for Recommendation to the BCC for approval and 2004 *Revised Selection Procedures for the Annual Distribution of the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund.*)

### M-DCPS Letters of Interest and the Resulting Interlocal Agreements

It should be noted that M-DCPS has been the only recipient of these grant funds since the *Trust Fund's* inception in 2003. Because the funds are collected throughout the course of the fiscal year by the Clerk of Courts, the total amount of funds available for dispersal is only known at the close of the fiscal year. As such, the funds are dispensed as reimbursement for the prior year's eligible expenses. Beginning with the first ILA between the County and M-DCPS in 2003, the ILA has always provided payment in arrears for services rendered during the specific fiscal year.<sup>22</sup> Those services are detailed in a Letter of Interest (LOI) M-DCPS prepares and submits to the County in response to the County's advertisement of available funds in the *Trust Fund*. The LOI, which is intended to show how the School District meets the *Trust Fund's* established criteria, is prepared by the M-DCPS Office of Financial Operations/Budget for the Chief

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Financial Officer's (CFO) signature. This process is also done in coordination with the Office of the Controller for the submission of invoices for payment.

Based on the LOIs, and due to the fact that M-DCPS has been the sole responder to the County's advertisements and no formal selection process was required, the County and M-DCPS thereafter entered into an ILA for each year's provision of driver education trust funds. The ILA, which is first executed by the Superintendent on behalf of the School Board, is then placed on the BCC's agenda for approval. The entire ILA package consists of the County Administration's Recommendation Memorandum, the resolution approving the ILA, the Agreement itself, and several attachments.<sup>23</sup> Attachments A and B were those attachments that accompanied the LOI (Attachment A being an Overview and Attachment B being the DEP course curriculum), and Attachment C is M-DCPS' *Line Item Budget Justification* that shows, on a summary basis, the costs in the categories of personnel salaries and fringe benefits, gasoline, and repairs.

Notably, Article 2 of the Agreement sets forth the *Use of Funds* and states that the School Board represents it has provided driver education services in accordance with the Dori Slosberg Act and County Ordinances, which "must include behind the wheel experience."<sup>24</sup>

### Eligible vs. Ineligible Expenses

In order to qualify for funding through the County's *Trust Fund*, eligible program expenses had to meet the criteria established by Resolutions R-618-03 and R-864-04. Based on that criteria, the qualifying program <u>must include</u> behind-the-wheel experience; driver education <u>must be offered</u> to private as well as public school students in Miami-Dade County, and the funds <u>must not be used</u> for administrative or overhead expenses among others. Further, "[t]he grantee must agree to provide appropriate accountability/reporting procedures denoting all of the above."<sup>25</sup> Thus, any school not complying with the established criteria would not have been eligible for County funding.

Any M-DCPS expenses submitted for funding that included non-compliant schools would be considered "ineligible expenses." Ineligible expenses would include schools that did not have a driving range, instructional vehicles, or properly certified teachers to provide M-DCPS students the required behind-the-wheel driving experience. Personnel costs for those solely teaching a classroom only curriculum and/or teaching the Virtual Online Driver Education would be ineligible for reimbursement as those students did not receive any actual behind-the-wheel instruction. Furthermore, if non-public school

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students were not afforded the opportunity to participate in the DEP, then that could be considered a breach of the ILA, which would deem all program costs ineligible for reimbursement from the County's *Trust Fund*.

#### VI. INDIVIDUALS COVERED IN THIS REPORT

### Dr. Jayne Greenberg, District Director (retired), M-DCPS Physical Education, Health Literacy and Life Skills

Dr. Jayne Greenberg was a 34-year employee of M-DCPS, having retired on June 30, 2017. For the last six years of her tenure at M-DCPS (from July 2011 through June 2017), Dr. Greenberg, as the District Director in the Division of Life Skills, oversaw all aspects of the DEP except for its funding. In her position as the administrator over the DEP, she provided Martha Diaz, Chief Budget Officer, with information about the status of the DEP and its programming districtwide. Prior to her retirement in 2017, Dr. Greenberg reported to Lisette M. Alves, Assistant Superintendent, Office of Academics.

### Martha M. Diaz, Chief Budget Officer Financial Operations/Budget

Martha M. Diaz began her employment with M-DCPS in December 2000. Since 2017, Ms. Diaz has been the Chief Budget Officer. Her prior position from 2010 to 2017 was that of Executive Budget Director, and since 2010 Ms. Diaz's job responsibilities have included preparing the LOIs submitted to the County requesting reimbursements from the *Trust Fund* and serving as the point of contact with the County for all matters related to the *Trust Fund*. Since 2010, Ms. Diaz reported either to School Board Administrators, Judith Marte or Ron Steiger, depending on their positions.

#### Judith Marte, (former) Chief Financial Officer, M-DCPS Financial Services

Judith Marte began her employment with M-DCPS in September 2002 and spent approximately 15 years in various positions. Between 2007 and 2012 she served as the Chief Budget Officer (CBO). In 2012, she was promoted to Deputy Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and reported to Richard Hinds, the then CFO. In 2014, she was promoted to CFO, reporting directly to the Superintendent, and served in that position until her resignation in June 2017. The LOIs submitted to Miami-Dade County for Fiscal Years 2011-12 through 2015-16, which are the subject of this report, were submitted under the signature of Ms. Marte.

#### Ron Y. Steiger, Chief Financial Officer, M-DCPS Financial Services

Mr. Steiger began his employment with M-DCPS in September 2005 and has held numerous executive level positions. Between 2008 and 2012, he served as the Assistant CBO. In 2012, he was promoted to CBO, and in 2017 was promoted to CFO.

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Since becoming CFO, Mr. Steiger, due to questioning by the County, revised the reimbursement request submitted for FY 2015-16 by significantly reducing the number of eligible schools. He also signed the FY 2016-17 LOI, which the County has not yet paid.

#### VII. REVIEW METHODOLOGIES

During this investigation, the OIG coordinated with the State of Florida, Department of Revenue and the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles (DHSMV) to obtain records and background information relating to the State of Florida's requirements that school districts teach Driver Education. The OIG interviewed officials from Miami-Dade County, Office of Management and Budget, Grants Coordination Division (OMB); M-DCPS school site teachers and administrators; M-DCPS budgetary and finance officials; and M-DCPS officials directly involved in administering the DEP in Adult Education (prior to 2011) and the Day School (after 2011).

From the County's OMB, we received copies of LOIs and supporting documentation M-DCPS submitted, as well as correspondence records, ILA trust fund payments distribution data, ordinance and resolution information. The overwhelming bulk of the records obtained and reviewed in this investigation were M-DCPS electronic files and email correspondence that substantiate our findings that M-DCPS through the Office of Financial Operations/Budget and the CFO, knowingly submitted ineligible expenses to Miami-Dade County to obtain reimbursements from the *Trust Fund* for FY 2011-12, FY 2012-13, FY 2013-14, and FY 2015-16.

In addition to the aforementioned M-DCPS administrators introduced above, the OIG interviewed M-DCPS Adult Education Program administrators responsible for the DEP while it was under Adult Education. OIG Special Agents also interviewed several school site administrators and teachers at the following senior high schools: Hialeah, Hialeah-Miami Lakes, John A. Ferguson, Miami Beach, Miami Killian, Miami Norland, Miami Northwestern, Miami Sunset, North Miami Beach, South Dade, and Southwest Miami. From those administrators and teachers interviewed, we learned that several of them had previously taught Driver Education at other high schools. As such, we not only learned information about the Driver Education classes at the aforementioned high schools, but we also obtained information about the classes offered at several other senior high schools including: Alonzo and Tracy Mourning, Miami, Miami Central, Booker T. Washington, North Miami, Miami Springs, Felix Varela, Coral Gables, Coral Reef, and Miami Jackson.

As to the OIG's determination of ineligible expenses submitted by M-DCPS and reimbursed by the County from the *Trust Fund*, the OIG looked to the State statute and County ordinance as the authoritative criteria determining eligibility. In order to comply with the minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel instruction requirement mandated by the

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Dori Slosberg Act, a school must have functioning instructional vehicles; a DHSMV approved driving range; and instructors with the required certifications in driver education. We reviewed documentation M-DCPS staff provided and conducted site visits to ascertain which senior high schools had a driving range, functioning vehicles, and instructors with the certifications required to teach drivers education for the time period under review. Our assessment showed that six senior high schools met the required criteria: John A. Ferguson, Hialeah, Hialeah-Miami Lakes, Miami Beach, Miami Killian, and North Miami Beach.

Next, we reviewed the *Line Item Budget Justification* that was attached to the LOIs/ILAs. As explained earlier, these are high level summaries that depict costs in the categories of personnel salaries and fringe benefits, gasoline, and repairs. The details for those expenses were found in the *YTD Budget Availability*, a document prepared annually by M-DCPS that includes all expenditures attributable to each fiscal year. The *YTD Budget Availability* report segregates each expenditure category, such as teacher salaries, temporary instructors, retirement expenses, social security and Medicare taxes, gasoline, repairs, tires, etc. Additionally, within each individual expenditure category, a separate fund center associated with a senior high school is listed and includes the year-to-date amount expended.

To calculate the total amount of eligible expenses M-DCPS submitted, the OIG reviewed the *YTD Budget Availability* report for Fiscal Years 2011-12, 2012-13, and 2013-14.<sup>26</sup> The OIG gathered expenditures for each fund center associated with one of the six high schools identified as meeting the required criteria. Each category of expenditures was segregated, and totals were calculated. Additionally, other expenditures related to the DEP consisting of abatement salaries, gas, repair parts, and tires and tubes were included in the total amount of eligible expenditures. The remaining expenses M-DCPS submitted to the County were deemed ineligible as any driver education stemming from the other cost centers, i.e., high schools, did not meet the mandatory requirement of the minimum of 30 percent behind-the-wheel instruction.

We performed this calculation by cost center to determine eligibility with all stated County criteria except one—that driver education must be offered to private as well as public school students in Miami-Dade County.

This investigation was conducted in accordance with the *Principles and Standards for Offices of Inspector General*, *Quality Standards for Investigations*, as promulgated by the Association of Inspectors General.

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#### VIII. INVESTIGATIVE FINDINGS

FINDING 1: M-DCPS submitted \$6,281,814.74 of ineligible expenses to the County for reimbursement from the *Drivers Education Safety Trust Fund*.

#### Overview

The OIG investigation substantiated the complainant's allegations and determined that during School Years 2008-2009 through 2010-2011, the DEP was offered through the Adult Education Program, and was available to students (including students from non-public schools) immediately after school, in the evenings, on Saturdays, and during the summer. In April 2011, the DEP was no longer available through the Adult Education Program and was transferred to the Day School Program (secondary schools) effective July 1, 2011 and offered to students during School Year 2011-2012 and subsequent years, only during the school day. <sup>27</sup>

The OIG investigation revealed that once the DEP returned to the Day School Program, M-DCPS knowingly submitted ineligible expenses to the County for reimbursement from the *Trust Fund*. For the three fiscal years examined, M-DCPS wrongfully received over \$6.2 million from the *Trust Fund* that it was not qualified to receive. See Table 2 for the ineligible amounts by year; see OIG Schedule A for a detailed summary of ineligible expenses by cost category and cost center.

M-DCPS certified for these years that it met the qualifying criteria, established by both *Florida Statutes* and County Ordinance, at 36 to 37 high schools when only six of those high schools had working cars, driving ranges, and certified teachers.<sup>28</sup>

### Transitioning the DEP from Adult Education to the Day School Program for the 2011-2012 School Year

On or about, March 29, 2011, Robert Gornto, former Administrative Director of District/School Operations, sent a memorandum to Dr. Daniel Tosado, former Assistant Superintendent of District/School Operations, advising him of the pending changes to the DEP.<sup>29</sup> He notified Dr. Tosado that funding would no longer be available for students co-enrolled in an Adult Education Program such as driver education, therefore, starting on April 15, 2011, the beginning of the third trimester, the DEP should no longer be offered through the Adult Education Program.<sup>30</sup> He also informed Dr. Tosado that since driver education is a state-mandated course for secondary school students, with its own funding mechanism, it should be returned to the division that oversees secondary education within M-DCPS.<sup>31</sup> Mr. Gornto also alerted Dr. Tosado about the additional funds received through the Dori Slosberg Act for the enhancement of the DEP with "emphasis on safety."

On June 2, 2011, during the transition from the Adult Education Program back to Day School, Mr. Gornto met with Ms. Diaz, concerning the DEP ILA with the County. This meeting was to ensure that the Office of Financial Operations/Budget was aware that in order to qualify for funds from the Dori Slosberg Act, the DEP has a minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel requirement. On the same day, Ms. Diaz memorialized this meeting in an email to Mr. Steiger, with copies to Ms. Marte, Mr. Gornto and others with the subject line, "FW: Driver's Ed. Contract." (See Figure 1 below) In the email, Ms. Diaz not only pointed out the *Florida Statutes* minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel requirement but highlighted the paragraph in yellow emphasizing the requirement.

"Driver's Education provided under this Agreement must include behind the wheel experience, per Florida Statute 318.1215, a minimum of thirty percent of a student's time in the program must be behind-the-wheel training"

Bobby just passed by and he says that this is critical information that needs to be passed on since the cars are in the process of being sold!!

I looked up the statute and it states the 30% behind-the-wheel requirement, see print screen below:

In June 2011, as the DEP was being transitioned to the District's secondary schools, Dr. Richard Hinds, then Associate Superintendent and CFO, signed an LOI requesting funds for FY 2009-10 and FY 2010-11, for expenses incurred while the DEP was still under Adult Education.<sup>32</sup> The cover letter for this LOI, notified the County that M-DCPS met the necessary grant requirements, including behind-the-wheel experience and that its driver education was offered to private school students in Miami-Dade County. (See Figure 2 for an excerpt from the submitted LOI.)

Attached are the M-DCPS Driver Education Program Overview (Attachment A) and the Classroom Curriculum (Attachment B) which trains our students to become knowledgeable and proficient drivers.

Pursuant to the grant requirements:

- 1. the curriculum includes behind the wheel experience;
- driver's education is offered to private as well as public school students in Miami-Dade:
- 3. funds will not be used for administrative/overhead expenses; and
- 4. an appropriate accountability reporting system is in place, and will be provided.

The attachments to the LOI for Fiscal Year 2010-11 stated that four senior high schools and 11 adult centers offer driver education, and that "[o]f the 15 programs, 14 offer both

classroom and behind-the-wheel driving instruction." (See **Exhibit 2** for the entire LOI package including its attachments.)

On July 1, 2011, in anticipation of the DEP transfer, Dr. Jayne Greenberg, Executive Director, Physical Education and Health Literacy, notified all Senior High School Principals and Assistant Principals, in Briefing ID #9983, that due to legislative changes, Driver Education would no longer be offered through the Adult Education Program and would become part of the Day School Program as a classroom only instructional course. 33 During her interview with OIG Special Agents, Dr. Greenberg stated the purpose of the Briefing was not only to inform them that DEP had moved to the Day School but to inform staff of the changes impacting teachers delivering the curriculum. In her Briefing to the principals and assistant principals, Dr. Greenberg stated very clearly what the requirements were, including that teachers had to have additional certification to teach the driver education course.

On August 5, 2011, the Office of Financial Operations/Budget was notified when Milagros R. Fornell, Associate Superintendent, Curriculum and Instruction, sent a memorandum to Wirthy Fuentes, Budget Director, Office of Budget Management,<sup>34</sup> concerning "Driver Education Allocations and Funding." This memorandum included an attachment clearly (see Figure 3 below) identifying only 10 high schools with driving ranges capable of providing M-DCPS students with the required minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel instruction and 15 schools delivering only classroom instruction.

The OIG investigation revealed that out of the ten high schools identified in this attachment as having driving ranges, only six of those schools actually had working cars and properly certified teachers able to provide M-DCPS students with the mandated minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel instruction to qualify for funds under the Dori Slosberg Act. Those high schools were identified as John A. Ferguson, Hialeah, Hialeah-Miami Lakes, Miami Killian, Miami Beach, and North Miami Beach. The remaining four high schools identified—Miami Norland, Miami Northwestern, Miami Sunset, and South Dade—lacked properly certified teachers, working cars or both, making them incapable of providing the mandated minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel driving instruction required by both *Florida Statutes* and County Ordinance.

On January 19, 2012, Dr. Greenberg sent out Briefing ID #11242 to all principals and assistant principals spelling out in bullet form what the requirements were for the DEP instructors. (See Figure 4 below)

#### Figure 4

Driver Education Instructor Requirements:

- All Driver Education classes must be taught by teachers holding a valid Florida Teacher Certificate and a valid Driver Education Certificate/Endorsement by the Florida Department of Education. Out of field waivers are strictly prohibited.
- Senior high schools who do not have teachers with the required certifications can only offer Driver Education through online classes.
- Students entering Driver Education classes must be a minimum of 15 years of age.
- Teachers who hold the Driver Education certificate/Endorsement may only
  provide instruction and Driver Education Licensing Assistance Program
  (DELAP) testing to students presently enrolled in Driver Education at the
  school they teach in.

### M-DCPS' Submittal of an LOI and the Resulting ILA for Fiscal Year 2011-12 after the DEP Transferred to the Day School Program

The next County public notice took place during the month of December 2012. The County published its "Public Notice" in the *Miami Herald* announcing the availability of FY 2011-12 *Trust Funds* for eligible organizations. The deadline for submission of LOIs was listed as January 4, 2013, which coincided with the M-DCPS winter break. The public notice stated the grant requirements.

Additional grant requirements include: 1) curriculum must include behind the wheel experience; 2) the driver's education must be offered to private, as well as public school students, in Miami-Dade County; 3) funds cannot be used for administrative/overhead expenses; and 4) the grantee(s) must agree to provide appropriate accountability/reporting.

### Miami-Dade County Public Schools Driver Education Program

On January 3, 2013, Alphermelia Martin, Special Projects Administrator from the County's OMB, sent a courtesy email reminder to Ms. Diaz concerning the January 4, 2013 deadline for submission of the LOI on behalf of M-DCPS. Ms. Diaz emailed County officials, copying Ms. Marte and others, to inform them that the entire School Board was off until Monday, January 7<sup>th</sup>, but she would attempt to access the M-DCPS network and send the LOI as requested.

Ms. Marte promptly responded to Ms. Diaz and offered to assist with the preparation of the LOI. Working together on the LOI submission for FY 2011-12, Ms. Diaz and Ms. Marte modified the LOI from previous years and changed the language in Attachment A, *Overview of Miami-Dade County Public Schools' Driver Education Program.*

Atachment A is the one that I don't know if all of what is stated is still applicable, but I think it will do for now.

I will call Ms. Martin tomorrow morning and hand deliver it to them! No biggy for me, I'm a lot closer than you.

Although, Ms. Diaz offered to email Dr. Greenberg, she never did.

The OIG obtained the LOI for FY 2011-12 that was eventually submitted to the County on January 4, 2013. (**Exhibit 3**) We compared its Attachment A to the Attachment A that had been submitted for the prior year when the DEP was part of the Adult Education Program. As stated previously, Dr. Hinds' Attachment A for FY 2010-11, clearly identified 14 schools at M-DCPS providing both the classroom instruction and behind-the-wheel experience, required under the County criteria and *Florida Statutes*. In contrast, the new Attachment A (see Figure 7) does not identify the high schools offering behind-the-wheel driver education but states that it is offered numerous times during the day, with the option of being offered immediately after school, in the evenings and on Saturdays, each trimester.<sup>35</sup>

Currently, driver education is offered in the district's traditional senior high schools. Driver education is offered numerous periods per day, five days per week. Depending on the school site, these classes have the option of being offered in the afternoon, immediately following the conclusion of the regularly scheduled school day, in the evening, or on Saturdays each trimester. Private school students, as well as public school students, whose senior high schools do not offer driver education, may enroll in these classes at no cost. Driver education is offered both semesters of the regular school year as a one semester, elective course.

This new version of the LOI Attachment A, and all subsequent versions submitted to the County, were drafted to be purposely vague. It is clear from the communications between M-DCPS officials, contemporaneous with the transfer of the DEP from Adult Education to the Day School, they were unable to meet the funding criteria requirements established by County Ordinance and *Florida Statutes*.

The DEP, with behind-the-wheel instruction, was only offered at six high schools and only during school hours. It was not offered after school, evenings, or on Saturday. Furthermore, the DEP was never offered to non-public school students or public school students whose high schools did not offer driver education.

When interviewed, Ms. Diaz admitted having modified the verbiage used in Attachment A to infer all high schools were offering Driver Education versus providing a specific number of schools as in previous years; however, she claimed it was under the direction of Ms. Marte. Ms. Diaz admitted not having verified any of the information provided in the LOI with Dr. Greenberg prior to its submission to the County. She further stated they were aware that not all the high schools had cars and that some cars were in bad shape. Ms. Diaz admitted writing the LOIs and corresponding attachments as if <u>all</u> the high schools had cars, when that was not the case. When asked if Ms. Marte and Mr. Steiger were aware of this information, she stated they all knew.

The OIG also took Ms. Marte's sworn statement. Ms. Marte admitted to OIG Special Agents that Ms. Diaz notified her of the changes to Attachment A. Ms. Marte further admitted she reviewed and approved Ms. Diaz's changes to Attachment A before Ms. Diaz submitted the FY 2011-12 LOI, and attachments, to the County.

On January 10, 2013, six days after the LOI had been submitted to the County, Ms. Diaz sent Dr. Greenberg an email acknowledging that although DEP was now reporting to her—Dr. Greenberg—she completed the LOI package and submitted it by the County's deadline. The email acknowledges the transfer of the DEP from Adult Education to Day School and Ms. Diaz stated that she modified Attachment A to the best of her abilities.

She asked Dr. Greenberg to review the LOI and Attachments A and B and inform her of any material changes required on either one. She also attached the FY 2010-11 LOI for reference.<sup>36</sup>

The next day, Dr. Greenberg responded to Ms. Diaz, with copies to Ms. Marte and Mr. Steiger, informing them that the information contained in Attachment A was <u>not correct</u>. "We only offer Driver Education during the school day and it is not offered after school, on weekends, or to private school students." Included in her email, Dr. Greenberg attached her markup of the LOI Attachment A (Figure 8).

In an email exchange on January 28, 2013, between Dr. Greenberg and Ms. Diaz, with copies to Ms. Marte, Mr. Steiger and others, Dr. Greenberg provided a spreadsheet with information deemed accurate for the DEP during the 2011-12 school year. This spreadsheet clearly notified Ms. Diaz and others, including Ms. Marte and Mr. Steiger, of the status of the DEP. The spreadsheet listed 27 schools and identified ten schools as having driving ranges.<sup>38</sup> But the spreadsheet also showed that four of those high schools lacked certified teachers to properly teach and meet the minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel requirement. (**Exhibit 4**)

Although Ms. Diaz was put on notice by Dr. Greenberg that only six high schools qualified for reimbursement under the LOI, two days later Ms. Diaz, responding in an email to the County's request for a list of the schools providing driver education, sent a list of 36 high schools. (**Exhibit 5**)

During her interview, Ms. Diaz was asked to review Dr. Greenberg's spreadsheet provided to her on January 28, 2013. Ms. Diaz admitted that Dr. Greenberg made her aware that only ten schools had ranges but only six qualified for funds. She stated to OIG Special Agents, "it was wrong; it was wrong to have claimed schools that we shouldn't have claimed." When asked if she purposely submitted knowing it was wrong, she replied "yes, sir." She stated that she submitted her list of 36 senior high schools knowing it did not meet the statute or grant requirements to recover costs, claiming, "I mean that's the only reason." She stated that although they were incurring costs, "only a portion of those costs were eligible for the requirements of the *Dori Slosberg Trust Fund.*" Ms. Diaz further admitted it was done for the sole purpose of receiving 100 percent of the funding available from the County to cover teacher salaries and fringe benefits. Ms. Diaz insisted that both Ms. Marte and Mr. Steiger asked her to submit all M-DCPS DEP expenditures to the County, and stated to OIG Special Agents, "I wouldn't have done it otherwise."

It should be noted that among the list of the 36 high schools were 14 schools that only provided the Virtual Online Driver Education course through the Florida Virtual School Program. These online courses only have a "Facilitator" whose responsibility is to observe students and ensure they complete their assignments. All lesson plans and curriculum are provided to students by a Florida Virtual School Program teacher and not the classroom "Facilitator." As a result, a "Facilitator" could be monitoring students taking different virtual online courses during a class period. During an interview with County representatives from OMB concerning the use of "Facilitators," it was confirmed that under the Dori Slosberg Act and the County's *Driver Education Safety Trust Fund*, the virtual school online delivery method is not a reimbursable expense. Mere supervision of a group of students participating in a virtual school program is considered an administrative cost not covered by the grant. This language is clearly mentioned in the County Ordinance and state statute as well as in the LOIs submitted by M-DCPS clearly stating, "funds will not be used for administrative/overhead expenses," but were still included for payment by the County, as if they met the funding criteria.

The County relied on the information Ms. Diaz provided on behalf of M-DCPS to obtain funds from the *Trust Fund*. Superintendent Alberto Carvalho signed the ILA on May 21, 2013.

Accordingly, on September 17, 2013, the County Mayor issued a Memorandum to the Chairwoman and Members of the BCC recommending the approval of an "Interlocal Agreement between the County and the Miami-Dade County School Board (School

Board) for the provision of Drivers' Education in the amount of \$2,519,619.35."<sup>39</sup> In its "Recommendation" the County states that the reason for the significant increase in the amount requested (which was previously \$388,095.00) was due to M-DCPS' "decision to again provide Driver Education programs in high schools as opposed to just their adult education facilities." Additionally, the Mayor's recommendation, as demonstrated below in Figure 9, stated that the funding "covers all costs associated with providing classroom and behind the wheel instruction to students at thirty-six public high schools...."

#### Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve the attached Interlocal Agreement between the County and the Miami-Dade County School Board (School Board) for the provision of Drivers' Education by the School Board in the amount of \$2,519,619.35. This amount will be paid from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund (Trust Fund) available for the period of October 1, 2011 to September 30, 2012, and provides for payment in arrears for services rendered during that period. The significant increase in the amount requested from the previous year (which was \$388,095.00) is due to the School Board's decision to again provide Driver's Education programs in high schools as opposed to just their adult education facilities. Funding covers all costs associated with providing classroom and behind the wheel instruction to students at thirty-six public high schools throughout the County.

The ILA listed the adopted criteria required to obtain funds, which read: "grant funds support driver's education programs offered by a public school system or nonprofit private school; private driving schools established principally for the purpose of driver education are not eligible; curriculum must include behind the wheel experience; driver's education must be offered to private as well as public school students; grantee must agree to provide appropriate accountability and reporting procedures; and funds may not be used for administrative/overhead expenses." The ILA contained an additional 22 Articles with clear and binding language for qualification and payment of funds. Specifically, under Article 2, M-DCPS represented it provided driver's education services in accordance with State Statutes, County Ordinance and Resolutions.

On September 17, 2013, the BCC unanimously approved the ILA package submission recommended by the Mayor as Resolution R-714-13. (**Exhibit 6**) On December 4, 2013, the County issued payment to M-DCPS in the amount of \$2,519,619.35 from the *Trust Fund* for the DEP expenses claimed for FY 2011-12.

#### M-DCPS LOIs & Request for Funds from FY 2012-13 through FY 2016-17

On November 13, 2013, the County again placed a Public Notice in the *Miami Herald* requesting LOIs. On that same day, Ms. Diaz emailed Dr. Greenberg and asked her to review the "attached LOI Attachment A and B." Again, in an email exchange on November 18, 2013, Dr. Greenberg informs Ms. Diaz that the driver education is only offered during the school day and not on weekends or afterschool (Figure 10).

What stands out right away is Attachment A since we only offer Driver Education during the school day. We do not offer it on weekends or afterschool.

On November 22, 2013, the LOI, signed by Ms. Marte, and Attachment A and B, were sent to the County. Attachment A still included the same language as the one sent out for FY 2011-12, including "driver education is offered at the district's traditional senior high schools, numerous periods per day, five days per week...Depending on the school site...in the afternoon...evening, or on Saturdays each trimester...."

During her interview, OIG Special Agents reminded Ms. Diaz that Attachment A was never modified to reflect Dr. Greenberg's changes. Ms. Diaz responded that "the verbiage should have been changed to reflect that." When asked during her sworn interview, why she did not notify the County or make the necessary changes based on Dr. Greenberg's responses, Ms. Diaz stated, "I'm going to be perfectly honest, I mean there is, again to be able to get the money reimbursed. I mean there is no other way around it." Ms. Diaz further stated, "Because we wouldn't have been able to get the money otherwise. If you didn't meet all those qualifications, you would not be reimbursed by the County." Ms. Diaz was asked, based on everything she had reviewed, if the information she provided the County was truthful? She immediately responded, "No!" When asked if she and her office purposely lied to the County to get the money, Ms. Diaz said, "That is basically what's happening." Ms. Diaz further stated, "It was submitted and, I mean, we were, to the best of our knowledge, trying to meet all of the requirements but based on budgetary restrictions we weren't able to buy the cars and that's that. And we weren't able to provide the classes on Saturday." Ms. Diaz stated that her office continued to mislead the County to get the funds for the program

and "to recover our costs. That's basically it." When asked directly, if they did not qualify for the funding, then, why did they submit the salaries to get funded? Ms. Diaz said, "it was wrong." She reiterated that both Ms. Marte and Mr. Steiger were fully aware of the issues with the program and that the LOIs submitted to the County were misleading in order to get the money.

The OIG investigation revealed that M-DCPS, through the Office of Financial Operations/Budget and the CFO, specifically, Ms. Diaz and Ms. Marte, continued knowingly submitting to the County, LOIs reflecting ineligible expenses for FY 2012-13, FY 2013-14, FY 2014-15, and FY 2015-16 (**Exhibit 7A through 7C**). Each subsequent LOI requested funding for 36 or 37 high schools claiming the schools met the required criteria established by *Florida Statutes* and County ordinance, knowing that only six high schools qualified.

In sum, the County relied on the ineligible expenses Ms. Diaz and Ms. Marte submitted and entered into additional ILAs with M-DCPS reimbursing M-DCPS millions of dollars of ineligible expenses under the *Trust Fund*. On September 16, 2014, the County entered into an ILA with M-DCPS in the amount of \$3,170,463, related to the LOI and other supporting documents and invoices for funding of the DEP for FY 2012-13. This ILA identified the increase in funds from the previous fiscal year as follows:

The significant increase in the amount requested from the previous year (which was \$2,519,619.35) is due to the School Board's decision to again provide Driver's Education programs in high schools as opposed to just their adult education facilities. Funding covers all costs associated with providing classroom and behind the wheel instruction to students at thirty-seven public high schools throughout the County.

On October 5, 2016, the County again relied on Ms. Diaz and Ms. Marte's submission of ineligible expenses for FY 2013-14 and entered into an ILA approving the amount of \$2,439,579.68. It should be noted that although previous ILAs with the County included Dr. Hinds, the CFO at the time, as the County contact, this ILA negotiated between Ms. Marte and Ms. Diaz had Dr. Greenberg as the contact for the County. Pursuant to Dr. Greenberg's statement to the OIG, she never saw the ILA and was not privy to any of the documentation claiming the cost reimbursement from the County. In the same LOI for FY 2013-14, M-DCPS included its claim for funds for FY 2014-15, again falsely alleging 37 high schools met the qualifying criteria when only six high schools qualified. The LOI's Attachment A included a list of 37 high schools claiming they offered the classes for FY 2013-14, and a separate list for FY 2014-15. (See **Exhibit 7B.**) The County did not process the LOI for FY 2014-15, because its Public Notice only included funding for FY 2013-14. Accordingly, only FY 2013-14 was approved and paid.

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The last LOI Ms. Marte signed and submitted to the County was for FY 2015-16. (See **Exhibit 7C.**)<sup>40</sup> This LOI was modified from "the curriculum includes behind the wheel experience" to "thirty percent of a student's time in the program is behind-the-wheel training." As in the LOI for FY 2013-14 and the attempt made for FY 2014-15, the LOI's Attachment A was modified to state as follows:

For fiscal year 2015-2016, there were 2,314 students enrolled in the Drivers' E Program and the classes were offered at the schools listed below:

On January 24, 2018, during negotiations and submission of backup documentation supporting the LOI of April 18, 2017, for the FY 2015-16 claim that 36 high schools were providing driver education classes and behind-the-wheel instruction, Mr. Steiger, now the CFO, revised the number of high schools from 36 to three. As a result of the reduction in qualifying schools, the County and M-DCPS executed an ILA on December 4, 2018, in the amount of \$343,960.00. Due to the M-DCPS correction to its claim from 36 to three high schools, the "Scope" section in the memorandum to the BCC for approval of the ILA was modified to read as follows:

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While the Miami-Dade County School Board offers driver's education at various schools through online instruction, behind-thewheel training, as required by the Dori Slosberg Act and as reimbursed under this agreement, is available at three Miami-Dade County Public Schools, including John A. Ferguson Senior High, Hialeah-Miami Lakes Senior High and North Miami Beach Senior High.<sup>41</sup>

In 2018 the County again published a public notice seeking LOIs for driver education funds for FY 2016-17. Mr. Steiger, now the CFO, signed the LOI on August 31, 2018, on behalf of M-DCPS, with the following modifications:

Pursuant to the grant requirements we will be claiming reimbursement of cost:

1. for the schools which provide a minimum of 30% of a student's time in the driver's education program obtaining behind the wheel training....

Other than the memorandum and Attachment A, there were no other changes to the LOI submitted to the BCC. The list of high schools added during Ms. Marte's tenure, was deleted from Attachment A; however, the remaining language in Attachment A remained the same.

#### M-DCPS Claimed Amounts

In order to justify expenses and collect funds from the County, M-DCPS through Ms. Diaz and Assistant Controller Daisy Naya, submitted invoices (**Composite Exhibit 8**) and *Line Item Budget Justification* forms, for FYs 2011-12, 2012-13, and 2013-14. The M-DCPS written justification on the form was the same (verbatim) as the opening paragraphs used on Attachment A of the LOIs Ms. Diaz and Ms. Marte had provided to the County. This language included that the driver education was offered in the district's traditional high schools "numerous periods per day, five days per week...afternoon...evening, or on Saturdays...." (**Composite Exhibit 9**) Additionally, in the forms section identified as (for example 2013-14 form), "Personnel: Salaries and fringe benefits = \$3,158,901.92," followed by language justifying that the "salary and fringes being charged are directly related to driver's education instruction. Instruction is offered county-wide at various locations at the secondary and postsecondary levels providing certification in drug and alcohol abuse, driving theory, and practical driving experience for each student. There is no administrative cost included for each school

site." However, this justification is untrue because the \$3,158,901.92 includes administrative costs incurred for virtual driver education and classroom instruction only. At the end of that paragraph, they added; "One teacher and vehicle is [sic] used exclusively for disabled students and is ADA equipped." This statement was accurate until November 30, 2015, when the teacher retired and was never replaced. On the day of his retirement, the teacher parked the Special ADA equipped vehicle at the North Transportation Center and it was never moved or used again. The car was parked in the same spot on May 23, 2017 and was still in the same spot as of April 6, 2021, when OIG Special Agents conducted inspections.

Another inaccurate statement is made in the "Summary" section, claiming, "Vehicles are housed in safety cages located on the Drivers' Education range at each school to provide security and to dissuade vandalism." The OIG investigation revealed M-DCPS did not have safety cages at all schools as mentioned in the line item budget justification. In fact, OIG Special Agents observed and documented safety cages housing DEP cars at only three high schools—John A. Ferguson, North Miami Beach, and Miami Northwestern. Miami Northwestern did not have DEP cars at the time of the review.

Included with the *Line Item Budget Justification* forms were budget availability reports for Basic Instruction of Driver Education expenditures incurred by M-DCPS. These reports were referenced under the *Personnel: Salaries and fringe benefits* section that read: "Attached is a breakdown of full time and part-time direct payroll costs." The reports specifically identified the expenses incurred for a specific fiscal year, broken down by teacher salary, teacher half-day, temporary instruction, abatement salaries, retirement, social security, Medicare, medical insurance, workers compensation and liability coverage, Vista distribution, gasoline expenses, supplies, repair parts, and tires and tubes. The OIG analyzed the expenses M-DCPS provided and has determined that \$6,281,814 of ineligible expenses were submitted, which the County reimbursed. (See Table 2 above on page 15.)

#### Status of the DEP

On an annual basis, Dr. Greenberg provided Ms. Diaz with the results of a survey she conducted reflecting the status of the DEP. (**Composite Exhibit 10**) The information from these survey spreadsheets have been summarized by the OIG and are reflected in Table 3. The survey spreadsheets provided to Ms. Diaz, included the number of high schools with driving ranges and working cars and the number of properly certified teachers qualified to teach M-DCPS students the mandated minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel instruction, required to qualify for County funding. These surveys provided Ms. Diaz with accurate information on the status of the DEP, however, Ms. Diaz continued submitting false and misleading information to the County that 36 or 37

high schools were providing driver education, including the mandated minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel experience.

During the investigation, OIG Special Agents obtained copies of the M-DCPS Master Class Lists going back to School Year 2011-2012 and identified all teachers teaching Driver Education courses. OIG Special Agents focused on the ten high schools previously identified in the August 5, 2011, memorandum as having a range. At the time, there were only ten high schools with a driving range: John A. Ferguson, Hialeah, Hialeah-Miami Lakes, Miami Killian, Miami Beach, Miami Northwestern, South Dade, and Miami Sunset.

OIG Agents conducted sworn interviews at each location and reviewed pertinent records to determine which of the ten high schools qualified for the funding during School Years 2011-2012 through 2016-2017. Only six of the ten high schools on the list included in the memorandum, met the funding criteria established by *Florida Statutes* and County ordinance with properly certified teachers, driving ranges, and working cars capable of providing M-DCPS students with the required minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel driving experience. Miami Norland, Miami Northwestern, South Dade, and Miami Sunset did not meet the criteria.

In April and May 2019, during the interviews and inspections of the ranges, OIG Special Agents observed and photographed the existing fleet of cars and driving ranges that the DEP was presently using. (See photos of the driving ranges and cars, **Composite Exhibit 11.**) During the interviews and inspections, OIG Special Agents determined that the existing fleet of working cars the schools were using for the DEP, including



behind-the-wheel instruction, ranged in age between model years 1998 and 1999—approximately 20 years old or more. Most of the cars throughout the district were in horrible condition, including cars with shattered windows, flat tires, rusted and dented roofs, and doors. At one location the car was serving as an iguana nest. (Please note the iguana and eggs circled in red in the photos.)

One Driver Education teacher from Hialeah Senior High, stated that a few years earlier she taught students behind-the-wheel using a stick to shift gears because the actual gear shifter had broken off. At another school, the driver education teacher was using an electric golf cart to teach the students how to drive.<sup>43</sup> (See Figure 15 below.)

Additionally, OIG Special Agents confirmed that during FY 2018-19, the DEP was operating at only three high schools—John A. Ferguson, Hialeah-Miami Lakes, and North Miami Beach. Although, Miami Killian had a driving range and four working cars, it did not have a properly certified teacher. Accordingly, the cars were not in use for behind-the-wheel instruction.

It should be noted that during the interviews, OIG Special Agents were very impressed with the tenacity and professionalism with which teachers dealt with adversity to ensure their students would receive an education while lacking the necessary equipment. Their creativity and ingenuity in doing what they had to do, in spite of a lack of resources, was nothing short of spectacular. There were teachers that brought their personal video game consoles so their students could practice their driving skills. The teachers claimed they "had to get them to drive some kind of way" even if it was using a video game and a small steering wheel. There were teachers who paid for gasoline out of their own pockets and got to school early to charge up the batteries on the cars to ensure they would start. As previously mentioned in the body of this report, one teacher inserted a stick in the shift column so students could shift gears and yet another used an electric golf cart. Even with the adversities they faced, the DEP teachers were acknowledged

by alumni of this program. One teacher said it best, when he said it made him feel good when he would run into his past students and they tell him, "Coach, I still haven't gotten a ticket."

# FINDING 2: M-DCPS failed to offer driver education classes to private school students as required by the ILA with Miami-Dade County.

During the course of this investigation, OIG Special Agents determined that in all of its LOIs, *Line Item Budget Justification* forms, and signed ILAs with the County, M-DCPS knowingly and falsely attested that the DEP was offered to private school students and public school students whose schools did not offer driver education. Shortly after the transition of the DEP to the Day School Program, Dr. Greenberg notified Ms. Diaz, Ms. Marte, Mr. Steiger, and others in email correspondence, "We only offer Driver Education during the school day and it is not offered after school, on weekends, or to private school students." (See Figure 8 on page 22 and Footnote 37.)

Furthermore, Dr. Greenberg informed parents that students could only participate in the DEP at the schools they attended. OIG Special Agents obtained email correspondence between Dr. Greenberg and a parent dated November 1, 2014, informing the parent that only five schools offer driver education on range programs and are only open to students who attended those schools.<sup>44</sup>

In her sworn interview, Ms. Diaz was asked if private school students and public school students, whose schools did not offer driver education, could enroll in the DEP after it transferred to the Day School Program. Ms. Diaz responded that she had brought that question up, claiming she asked Mr. Steiger, "So how is this being met?" She also claimed to have informed Mr. Steiger and Ms. Marte that "we can't meet this requirement, which is one of the requirements per the County." She stated it was Mr. Steiger's contention that those students could register and take the class during either the first or last period of the school day and that's how Mr. Steiger felt they were meeting that requirement.

When asked if any outside students actually registered to take the DEP at a high school with a driving range, Ms. Diaz replied, "No," she did not think they had any outside students in the program. When asked if this special registration policy was written anywhere, such as in a School Board Policy, Briefing or other memorandum, Ms. Diaz replied that this was originally communicated to her verbally and later by email, but she was not aware of it ever being written and submitted as a policy or a briefing. The OIG requested a copy of the email, but no such email has been produced. <sup>46</sup>

During Mr. Steiger's sworn interview, he was informed that the OIG had been told that it was his contention that private school students and public school students, whose schools did not offer driver education, could take driver education at one of the high schools with a driving range. He replied that students could enroll in any of the classes offered by M-DCPS. He stated that students could do it during any period but the first and last periods made sense. He was asked if this information was provided to all principals and assistant principals in a Briefing or written in a School Board Policy. He promptly stated that he was the Budget Office and had no idea; he did not run the DEP.

OIG Special Agents showed Mr. Steiger copies of email correspondence between Dr. Greenberg, Ms. Diaz, and him that reiterated the fact that the DEP was only offered during the regular school day and <u>not</u> after school, on weekends, or to private school students. After reviewing the emails, Mr. Steiger stated he still felt private school students could attend. The OIG also showed Mr. Steiger the email exchanges between Dr. Greenberg and two parents in which both stated that there are only a few high schools with driving ranges, but only the students attending that high school could take the driver education class. Mr. Steiger acknowledged that Dr. Greenberg took the exact opposite position to his. He further acknowledged that there was nothing in writing and no information provided to the program managers or principals that private school students could take driver education.

During her sworn interview, Dr. Greenberg was informed that it was Mr. Steiger's contention that students attending private or other public schools could attend the behind-the-wheel driver education course during the first or last period of the school day. When asked if Mr. Steiger ever mentioned this to her, she stated, "Absolutely not!" She stated she did not recall ever seeing a policy or a briefing mentioning it either.

Ms. Marte stated in her interview that she had no recollection of Mr. Steiger ever mentioning that private school students and public school students could attend the behind-the-wheel driver education during the first or last period of the school day. She pointed out that she was the Deputy CFO during this period and was busy attending to her other responsibilities. She acknowledged receiving the emails from Dr. Greenberg but stated that she probably did not read them because she had only been copied on them.

It is obvious from the OIG's investigation, through our examination of email communications and via interviews, that all the parties involved in administering the DEP were clearly aware that M-DCPS was not offering or providing the driver education to any students in private schools or, for that matter, to district students in high schools that did not have a driving range. This was a requirement of the District's ILA with the County and, since the transfer of the DEP from Adult Education to the Day School, M-DCPS officials knowingly and falsely attested that the DEP was offered to private school students and public school students whose schools did not offer driver education. Despite Mr. Steiger's contention that those students could take the class—either in the first or last period of the day—was never communicated to any principals, program managers, or to any parents. Clearly, teenagers attending private schools were not notified as there was no advertisement of this opportunity.

FINDING 3: M-DCPS violated the Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education
Act beginning with the 2015-2016 school year until the suspension of the DEP in March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Prior to December 2015, M-DCPS had one instructor and one working vehicle adapted to provide driving instruction to students with orthopedic impairments (hereinafter the Adaptive Driver Education vehicle). This one vehicle, a 1998 Chevrolet Monte Carlo (Monte Carlo), was old and in poor condition but was nevertheless operational. Michael Frissora, a District Specialist with the Life Skills and Special Programs, was the sole M-DCPS instructor certified to provide driver education for the Adaptive Driving Program for Orthopedically Impaired Students. Mr. Frissora retired on November 30, 2015. Since that time, M-DCPS has continued to provide driver education instruction, but because it did not provide driver education instruction to orthopedically impaired students, M-DCPS has been in violation of the *Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act* (IDEA)<sup>47</sup> and other federal laws.<sup>48</sup> These laws require that students with disabilities be given equal educational opportunities.

As the only designated and certified adaptive driver education teacher for M-DCPS, Mr. Frissora's primary responsibility was to provide driving instruction to students with physical disabilities. Upon his retirement from M-DCPS, Mr. Frissora returned the only Adaptive Driver Education vehicle, the aforementioned Monte Carlo, to the District's North Transportation Center.<sup>49</sup>

OIG Special Agents interviewed Toolsie Harbajan, Manager at the North Transportation Vehicle Maintenance Center. Mr. Harbajan identified the Monte Carlo and recalled Mr. Frissora dropping off the vehicle on November 30, 2015. He further mentioned that the vehicle had not been moved since it was dropped off. He stated that on December 1, 2015, the next day, he emailed Dr. Greenberg informing her that the Adaptive Driver Education vehicle was at his facility. He recalled Dr. Greenberg telling him to hold the car at his site until she received further instruction. Mr. Harbajan explained that due to Dr. Greenberg's request, he did not conduct a vehicle inventory to determine the vehicles contents or condition. He further stated that he has not had any further communication with Dr. Greenberg since the initial email interaction and he confirmed that no one associated with the DEP has ever checked on the vehicle since it was dropped off.

Mr. Harbajan provided OIG Special Agents access to the Monte Carlo to document its condition. Immediately after identifying the vehicle, OIG Special Agents observed a wasp nest inside the fuel access cover and noticed the deteriorating state of the

vehicle's tires. (See **Composite Exhibit 12**) On April 6, 2021, OIG Special Agents observed that the Monte Carlo was still parked in the same spot, with no sign that it has been moved.

During her sworn interview, Dr. Greenberg confirmed that Mr. Frissora was the only certified Adaptive Driver Education teacher at the time. She stated Mr. Frissora was transferred from Special Education to the Division of Life Skills to work under her supervision when the DEP moved to the Day School. Dr. Greenberg stated that the "learning disabled" students could be taught at their respective schools, but the "physically disabled" students required the Adaptive Driver Education car with hand controls. She concurred that since Mr. Frissora's retirement, students with physical disabilities were not able to take driver education courses because the adaptive learning courses were not available.

Dr. Greenberg acknowledged that the Monte Carlo was in very bad shape. She explained that, even prior to Mr. Frissora's November 2015 retirement, she asked that the Adaptive Driver Education car be replaced. She stated that her funding request was denied.

The OIG recovered several emails corroborating Dr. Greenberg's statements that she attempted to not only purchase new vehicles for the DEP but specifically requested the purchase of another vehicle equipped to teach Adaptive Driver Education. In a June 2013 email, Dr. Greenberg attempted to get authorization to purchase a new Adaptive Driver Education vehicle, but Mr. Steiger turned her down. The email thread included a response from Mr. Steiger stating, "[j]ust to be clear, we have no money in the budget to buy Drivers Ed cars in 2013-14; if that was a request you needed to add it to your budget for 2013-14 back in April...the budget is already balanced and there are no available funds." Contained in the same email thread, Dr. Greenberg writes on the same day, "Our greatest need is for a new car that provides driving instruction to students with disabilities. If we have the funds to at least purchase that car it would be appreciated...." Apparently, even prior to Mr. Frissora's retirement and the mothballing of the Monte Carlo, it was recognized that the Adaptive Driver Education vehicle needed replacement.

Having received the response from Dr. Greenberg, Mr. Steiger broke away from the group email and communicated directly with Ms. Marte and asked, "What do you think?"

Ms. Marte replied: "I think we are asking for a lawsuit by not having a handicapped car." 52

A replacement adaptive vehicle was not purchased then, in 2013, nor was one purchased after December 2015 when the Monte Carlo was dropped off at the North Transportation Center.<sup>53</sup>

What is also clear is that the position of driver education instructor for the Adaptive Driving Program has not been filled since Mr. Frissora's retirement. When asked why Mr. Frissora was not replaced, Dr. Greenberg stated the District decided not to fund the position.

Prior to her retirement on June 30, 2017, Dr. Greenberg, responding to a question posed by Assistant Superintendent Lisette M. Alves about meeting with a driver education service provider, stated:

What we really need is to outsource our driver education for students with disabilities. We no longer have a workable accessible car since Ron won't let us order one and the other was about 18 years old and could no longer be repaired. We did not replace the adaptive driver education teacher either when Mike Frissora retired last year. I think we were lucky this school year, but that is a service we REALLY need! If they can provide that, it would be great use of contractual funds.<sup>54</sup>

OIG Special Agents contacted the Office of Exceptional Student Education and obtained a breakdown of the number of students with a documented orthopedic impairment that would have qualified for Adaptive Driver Education at the District's high schools during 2015-2016, 2016-2017, and 2017-2018 school years. Based on the information provided, OIG Special Agents determined that M-DCPS would have had the opportunity to serve approximately 114 students during 2015-2016, 108 students during 2016-2017, and 114 students during 2017-2018.

As of the date of this report, OIG Special Agents verified that M-DCPS purchased 23 new vehicles for the DEP during the month of September 2020. M-DCPS has not yet purchased an ADA Certified vehicle for use in the Adaptive Driving Program and there is still no certified instructor to teach Adaptive Driver Education. Clearly getting a

teacher certified to instruct this program should be a priority for M-DCPS. It is anticipated that the DEP will be operational commencing with the 2021-2022 School Year, and unless Adaptive Driver Education is being offered, M-DCPS will once again be in violation of federal law.

## IX. RESPONSE TO THE DRAFT REPORT & OIG COMMENTS

This report, as a draft, was provided to Martha M. Diaz, Chief Budget Officer Financial Operations/Budget; Ron Y. Steiger, Chief Financial Officer; Dr. Jayne Greenberg (former District Director, Division of Life Skills); Judith Marte (former Chief Financial Officer) and Superintendent Alberto Carvalho for their review and submission of a discretionary written response. The OIG received a response on behalf of the administration from the Deputy Superintendent, which is attached in its entirety as Appendix A. The OIG did not receive a written response from Ms. Marte or Dr. Greenberg.

In summary, the response to the investigation's findings states that the transition from Adult Education Program to the Day School Program "resulted in operational limitations that became inconsistent with the requirements of the grant used to fund the DEP from 2011-2012 through 2013-2014." The response further states that the staff recognizes that going forward the funds should be used for enhancement of the program and not abatement of expenditures. It also praises the thoroughness of the investigation but at the same time states that the investigation relates to an issue that dates back one decade. It also emphasizes that since the 2015-2016 School Year the District has only requested reimbursement for DEP expenditures at school sites in compliance with the behind-the-wheel requirement and other eligibility requirements. It further acknowledges that the absence of the behind-the-wheel requirement disqualified the reimbursement of expenditures at "some of the schools."

Finally, and most importantly, the response states that the District accepts and is implementing the eight recommendations outlined in the OIG report, and thanks the District staff for their candor in addressing the OIG's inquiries.

The OIG does not agree with the response's position that the investigation relates to an issue that dates back one decade thereby minimizing the importance of this report. While the issue began a decade ago, in 2011 when the DEP was transferred back to the Day School Program, it has continued for years until the County began to question M-DCPS' reimbursement requests in 2018. The last ILA (for FY 2015-16) was signed on December 4, 2018, after almost a year of negotiations, which began in January 2018. As a result of the County's extensive scrutiny, the qualifying schools were reduced from 36 high schools to three high schools thereby reducing the amount of reimbursement requested to \$343,960.00 from \$2,439,579 reimbursed under the previous ILA.

Furthermore, in August 2018 the County published a Public Notice for FY 2016-17 and in July 2019 for FY 2017-18. M-DCPS submitted LOIs in response to both Public Notices, which have not yet been processed and remain pending for approval and reimbursement. This issue is clearly an on-going concern; and, as this investigation has revealed, there is a \$6.2 million overpayment that must be addressed.

### X. CONCLUSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Teenagers make up almost five percent of Florida's licensed drivers and 12 percent of all crashes. In 2018 alone, there were 47,583 crashes in Florida involving teen drivers, resulting in 90 teen driver fatalities. Ten of those fatalities were Miami-Dade County teen drivers. From 2015 through 2019 in Miami-Dade County, there were 56 teen driver fatalities and 287 teen drivers with serious bodily injuries. Just a few months ago in Boca Raton, an 18-year old driver lost control of his vehicle, hit a concrete pole, and his car landed on top of another. The 18-year old driver and two of his passengers, one only 13 years old, died. There were eight teenagers in his car, two in the front seat and six in the back seat, who were ejected just like in the Dori Slosberg tragedy. Five of those kids were hospitalized, the youngest being only twelve. The driver of the other car and his passenger died as well.

The Dori Slosberg Act was passed to educate teen drivers about the importance of traffic safety and to prevent these tragedies by providing public schools and non-public schools, throughout the different counties in the State of Florida, with additional funds for the enhancement of their Driver Education Programs.

Since Miami-Dade County's creation of the *Trust Fund* in 2002, which implemented the Dori Slosberg Act's provision allowing the County to collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty, M-DCPS has been the only recipient of these grant funds. Unfortunately, after the DEP was transferred from the Adult Education Program to the Day School Program in 2011, M-DCPS has been submitting ineligible expenses to the County for reimbursement, and as a result has received over \$6.2 million that it should not have been entitled to receive. M-DCPS misled the County in its requests for reimbursement, claiming that 36 to 37 high schools were providing the mandated minimum of 30 percent behind-the-wheel instruction, when, in fact, only six high schools had instructional vehicles, driving ranges, and properly certified teachers. Only the students attending those six high schools were able to get the behind-the-wheel experience. Most teenagers throughout the School District, wanting to learn how to drive, had to resort to Virtual Driver Education Classes without any behind-the-wheel instruction, which is required by statute in order to obtain the Class E Driver License.

Although M-DCPS was not required under Section 1003.48, *Florida Statutes*, to provide a minimum of 30 percent behind-the-wheel instruction to its students, it was required in order to qualify for reimbursement of trust funds under the Dori Slosberg Act and County Ordinance. Year after year, M-DCPS claimed that it was meeting that requirement in 36 and later 37 high schools, when it was not. This resulted in over \$6.2 million in overpayment. Under the Dori Slosberg Act, any reimbursement received from the *Trust Fund* was to be used to enhance the DEP. Instead of enhancing its program so it could meet all the requirements under the act, M-DCPS used the trust funds to practically pay 100 percent of its driver education classes, including classroom only, and virtual school, which was supposed to be funded under Section 1003.48.

Nevertheless, while it was egregious for M-DCPS administrators to have misled the County in order to be reimbursed for ineligible expenses, the students and the citizens of Miami-Dade County should not be punished for the actions taken by these individuals. Going forward, M-DCPS should ensure that any moneys claimed for reimbursement to the DEP should be used solely for enhancement of the program district-wide, as intended by the Dori Slosberg Act.

Accordingly, the OIG provides several recommendations for both the School Board and the County's consideration. While some recommendations address M-DCPS' operation of its DEP, the OIG strongly urges both governmental entities to come together to address the \$6.2 million overpayment to M-DCPS. Further the two entities are encouraged to shape how future potential disbursement of *Trust Fund* proceeds might be structured to ensure that the proceeds are used to enhance the District's statutory obligation to provide driver education as intended by the Dori Slosberg Act.

- 1. First and foremost, the OIG recommends that M-DCPS purchase an Adaptive Driver Education vehicle and hire an Adaptive Driver Education instructor for the upcoming School Year 2021-2022, or outsource it to an outside vendor.
- Regarding the \$6.2 million disbursed to M-DCPS for ineligible reimbursements, it
  is clear that M-DCPS cannot simply repay the *Trust Fund* without negatively
  impacting the DEP going forward. Yet for accountability, the ineligible
  reimbursement should be recompensed.

The OIG recommends that the County and M-DCPS structure a payment schedule to address the ineligible reimbursements. The partial amounts can be deducted from the reimbursements to be received in the future. Or, in the alternative, M-DCPS could demonstrate—to the County's satisfaction—that it is funding its DEP at enhanced levels and that those enhancements—not subject to reimbursement from the *Trust Fund*—would be a credit against M-DCPS' financial liability.

3. For the past 18 years, only one entity—M-DCPS—has received money from the *Trust Fund.*<sup>56</sup> While the requirement that grant funds be available to both public and non-public schools stems from the Dori Slosberg Act itself, it is feasible for the County to advertise grant funding availability in advance of the fiscal year's end anticipating that most, if not all, of the funding will go to M-DCPS. Notwithstanding light traffic patterns in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, based on historical collection rates, the Clerk and County should be able to provide a conservative estimate of funding availability. Because funding disbursements are currently made in arrears, sometimes two to three years after expenses are incurred, it is difficult, if not impossible, to make enhancements to the DEP.

The OIG recommends that the County and M-DCPS devise an acceptable process where the County may be able to provide M-DCPS an advance of funds at the commencement of the School Year to cover expenses for enhancement of the program. The County may want to require that M-DCPS show its DEP base budget and funding commitments, and separately state the enhancements to be funded with *Trust Fund* proceeds. Those enhancements might include vehicle purchases and extending the driver education program including the minimum 30 percent behind-the-wheel instruction to after school, weekends, or during summer school, where non-public school students could participate. At the conclusion of the school year, M-DCPS should be required to reconcile its actual expenses against the advance and provide a final report that identifies any additional eligible expenses incurred throughout the academic year.

- 4. For funds dispersed as an advance, the OIG recommends that M-DCPS create an account to be used exclusively for receipt of *Trust Funds* so that they not be comingled with other funds. This will allow the County to properly audit the DEP and its expenses.
- 5. For applications, requests for reimbursement, and reconciliations submitted by M-DCPS to the County for *Trust Fund* proceeds, these documents should be certified by the Instructional Supervisor/Program Manager, the Executive Director of the Curriculum Support Division of Life Skills, and the Deputy Superintendent, thus establishing a record of approvals and transparency of activities.
- 6. M-DCPS should publish the availability of the DEP to non-public school students and develop a summer DEP curriculum at designated high schools, representative of the student population in the County. The summer DEP should

give priority to non-public school students and public school students whose schools do not offer the behind-the wheel driving experience.

- 7. Currently, M-DCPS has purchased 23, four-door, 2020 Chevrolet Malibu's for the DEP. The cars have been designated for the following schools:
  - 3 cars to Hialeah-Miami Lakes Senior High School
  - 3 cars to Miami Senior High School
  - 2 cars to Miami Northwestern Senior High School
  - 2 cars to William H. Turner Tech. Arts High School
  - 3 cars to North Miami Beach Senior High School
  - 3 cars to Miami Beach Senior High School
  - 3 cars to Miami Killian Senior High School
  - 4 cars to John A. Ferguson Senior High School

The OIG verified the distribution of the cars and conducted a review of the schools to determine proper allocation of program resources. During its review, the OIG has determined that the current distribution of cars does not properly address the needs of the student population throughout the County. There are only two senior high schools, Miami Killian and John A. Ferguson, serving the southern portion of the County. There are currently *no* schools representing the student population in Doral, Miami Springs, Sweetwater, Westchester, and western portions of unincorporated Miami-Dade County. The review conducted by the OIG revealed Miami Springs Senior High School, Hialeah Senior High School, and South Dade Senior High School still had an on-campus driver education range that was not being used, however, these schools were not allocated cars. On the other hand, three cars were allocated to Miami Senior High School, which does not have an on-campus driving range. The OIG recommends that the District allocate all operable vehicles in an equitable manner.

8. The OIG also reviewed the existing storage capabilities for the vehicles of each of the eight senior high school locations and made the following observations:

Miami Beach	Yes	Has a new security cage to store its vehicles.
John A. Ferguson	Yes	Has a security cage and previous damage was repaired.
Miami Killian	No	The OIG was informed that a security cage would be built and the cars, which are currently at the Southwest Transportation Center, will be transferred upon completion.

The OIG recommends that M-DCPS build security cages for those senior high schools that were allocated vehicles, but do not have a safe place to store them.

In closing, a properly managed M-DCPS DEP available to all public high school and non-public high school students (including students with disabilities), with certified teachers, working cars, driving ranges, and up-to-date curriculum, would highly benefit students, parents, and all residents of Miami-Dade County.

While we acknowledge that the Superintendent's response indicates that it will be implementing our recommendations in this report, the OIG is requesting to be provided with a 90-day status report, on or before December 3, 2021.

We greatly appreciate the professionalism of OIG staff involved in the preparation of the above-referenced draft Report. Although the investigation relates to an issue that dates back one decade, we appreciate both the thoroughness of the OIG investigators and candor of District staff in addressing their inquiries. Below is the administration's response to the draft Report.

First, the District accepts and is implementing the eight recommendations outlined by the OIG in the Report.

As detailed in the Report, the transitioning of the Driver Education Program (DEP) from the Adult Education Program to the "Day School Program" in 2011 resulted in operational limitations that became inconsistent with the requirements of the grant used to fund the DEP from 2011-2012 through 2013-2014. The Report acknowledges that the categories of expenses submitted for reimbursement during that period (salaries, fuel, repairs, etc.) were in fact eligible, however, staff recognizes that going forward funds should be used for program enhancements and not abatement of expenditures. Further, although all funds received were used by the District for the DEP, the absence of a universal behind-the-wheel experience should have disqualified expenditures incurred at some schools.

Since the 2015-2016 school year, the District has only sought reimbursement for DEP expenditures at sites in compliance with the behind-the-wheel requirement and meeting other program eligibility criteria. Additionally, the District has purchased 23 new cars for the DEP and is expediting the purchase and retrofit one adaptive driver education vehicle for students with orthopedic impairments as well as hiring an adaptive driver education instructor.

District staff members currently involved in the DEP reimbursement process are fully aware of all elements of the eligibility criteria, including which expenditures are not eligible for reimbursement. Staff will collaborate with Miami-Dade County to restore an effective and accessible driver education program for students in our community and ensure that funds they deem were received through the reimbursement of ineligible expenses will be reinvested back into the DEP.

I will ensure that all OIG recommendations are fully implemented and that responsible bureau heads comply with all aspects of the DEP grant going forward. Should you require additional information, please feel free to call me, at 305 995-2393.

### RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the Board award a grant from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund (the "Trust Fund") to Miami-Dade County Public Schools in an amount not to exceed total fund collections for the period October 1, 2003 to September 30, 2004, estimated to be approximately \$1.1 million, and authorize the Manager to negotiate, execute, and amend the existing interlocal agreement with Miami-Dade County Public Schools for this purpose after approval by the County Attorney's Office. It is also recommended that the Board adopt the attached, revised selection procedures for the annual distribution of the Trust Fund and authorize the Manager to place an advertisement for FY 2004-05 Trust Fund collections requesting letters of interest from qualified organizations.

## BACKGROUND.

Pursuant to the Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act, 318.1215, Florida Statutes, effective October 1, 2002, the Board approved Ordinance No. 02-167 on September 24, 2002, creating the Trust Fund and directing the Manager to develop selection procedures for the Board's approval. Pursuant to Resolution R-618-03, the County approved selection procedures and thereafter advertised the availability of grant funding from the Trust Fund in June 2003. On July 22, 2003, the Board adopted Resolution R-858-03 awarding a Trust Fund grant to Miami-Dade County Public Schools in an amount not to exceed total Trust Fund collections for the period October 1, 2002 to September 30, 2003. The resulting interlocal agreement provided for payment in arrears to Miami-Dade County Public Schools for Driver's Education provided during the period October 1, 2002 to September 30, 2003.

The recommendations to extend the existing interlocal agreement with Miami-Dade County Public Schools and adopt the attached, revised procedures are based on the County's experience in implementing a competitive process last year to award the first year of Trust Fund collections; the fact that only one organization, Miami-Dade County Public Schools, responded to the notice of the availability of grant funds and picked up the application materials; only one application, from Miami-Dade County Public Schools, was received by the County; and that no other organization has expressed interest in these funds. An additional consideration was the criteria established by the Board to select organizations for grant awards. These criteria require that: grant funds are to support driver's education programs offered by a public school system or non-profit private school; private driving schools established principally for the purpose of driver education are not eligible;

the curriculum must include behind the wheel experience; driver's education must be offered to private as well as public school students; the grantee must agree to provide appropriate accountability and reporting procedures; and funds may not be used for administrative/overhead expenses. Therefore, it is recommended that the Board approve the revised selection procedures and that authority be granted to the County Manager to negotiate, execute, and amend the existing interlocal agreement with Miami-Dade County Public Schools awarding grant funds, as it is in the best interest of the County.

## REVISED SELECTION PROCEDURES FOR THE ANNUAL DISTRIBUTION OF THE DRIVER'S EDUCATION SAFETY TRUST FUND

#### Criteria

- The grant(s) must be awarded to a public school system or non-profit private school(s) that offers the opportunity to learn to drive
- It is provided, however, that this grant(s) shall not be awarded to private driving school(s) established principally for the purpose of driver education.
- · Curriculum must include behind the wheel experience
- The driver's education must be offered to private as well as public school students in Miami-Dade County
- Funds must not be used for administrative/overhead expenses
- The grantee must agree to provide appropriate accountability/reporting procedures denoting all of the above

#### Process

- Advertise availability of Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund grants and request letters of interest from qualified organizations
- Receive letters of interest and review eligibility of respondents based on the above criteria
- If only one letter of interest from a qualified organization is received, then the County Manager, or his designee, will negotiate an agreement and submit it to the Board for approval
- If more than one letter of interest from qualified organizations is received, then a
  competitive process will be conducted utilizing the scoring below, and the County
  Manager will present a recommendation for grant award(s) to the Board for
  approval

### Scoring (as needed)

A score sheet will be used, gauging the following:

- The quality of the proposed curriculum/program design as well as the extent to which it includes behind the wheel experience (40 percent)
- The extent to which the grantee intends to accommodate private as well as public school students (30 percent)
- Stated compliance with reporting requirements (15 percent)
- How reasonable the budget proposal appears (15 percent)

# OVERVIEW OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS' DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAM

Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) serve the students of Metropolitan Miami-Dade County, which includes the City of Miami, 27 outlying municipalities, and a large unincorporated area. M-DCPS has a total population of approximately 345,150 students, served by approximately 21,260 full-time teachers. This places M-DCPS as the fourth largest school district in the United States, and the largest school district in Florida. To more efficiently serve the needs of the 415 schools, the district is divided into four administrative regions supervised by Regional Centers.

Currently, driver education is offered in 4 senior high schools and 11 adult centers in M-DCPS. Of the 15 programs, 14 offer both classroom and behind the wheel driving instruction.

In addition to driver education classes offered during the regular school day, programs are also offered through the school system's Adult and Community Education programs. Depending on the school site, these classes have the option of being offered in the afternoon, immediately following the conclusion of the regularly scheduled school day, in the evening, or on Saturdays each trimester. Private school students, as well as public school students, whose senior high schools do not offer driver education, may enroll in these classes at no cost.

In the 3 senior high schools offering both classroom and actual driving instruction, minimally one teacher is assigned to each school. Driver education is offered numerous periods per day, five days per week. In the remaining senior high school offering classroom instruction only, driver education is offered various periods per day. Driver education is offered both semesters of the regular school year as a one semester, elective course.

### DRIVER EDUCATION CLASSROOM CURRICULUM

I. Students will be taught a basic knowledge of a Highway Transportation System (HTS), its purpose, major elements, effectiveness, and the roles by various components in the system.

Specifically, they will be able to identify the three major elements of the Highway Transportation System, how the success of each of the three major elements is dependent upon the other two and how to identify these methods by which the Highway Transportation System's effectiveness can be measured. They will be able to define the sub-system that have been established to manage the Highway Transportation System and their purpose. The students will learn the economic and social consequences resulting from breakdowns in the Highway Transportation System and the "multiple causes" theory of collisions as well as the rationale for using the term "collision" rather than "accident". Students will compare age group collision statistics and identify ways to improve the records for each grouping.

II. Students will be taught methods of basic control of the vehicle and be able to demonstrate this basic skill. Included will be exterior and interior pre-driving checks, control of motion and direction, and basic maneuvers.

Specifically, they will be taught to execute exterior and interior pre-driving checks and the steps a driver should take in starting the engine. They will learn the standard identity and location of each item found on the instrument panel and describe its function. This will include the function of each device used for safety, visibility, communication, and comfort in a standard passenger vehicle, correct procedures for starting the engine, placing the vehicle in motion, and stopping it safely will be taught. They will be taught the techniques of proper steering for forward and reverse driving. They will learn the steps for making correct lane changes, and how to make a right and left turn at an intersection. The steps used to park a vehicle parallel, angled, and perpendicular to the curb or roadway, will be covered as well. Students will learn the advantages and disadvantages for selecting maneuvers and procedures used in reversing the direction of a vehicle.

III. Students will learn to understand, interpret and react properly when exposed to signs, signals, and pavement markings.

Specifically, students will learn to classify traffic signs into the categories of regulatory, warning, and information/guide as well as interpret and react properly when exposed to these traffic signs. They will be able to define the meaning of the different shapes, colors, and international symbols used to code traffic signs. The ability to describe the appropriate actions used to obey the legal and practical implications of regulatory and warning signs will be taught. They will learn to identify and describe traffic control signals that regulate traffic flows or warn drivers and/or pedestrians of hazards and to

identify and describe the system that control traffic light changes. Students will be able to identify the types of pavement markings by color, configuration, and direction and their importance when planning one's actions.

IV. Students will learn to identify potential hazard that may happen in regard to each possible danger based on minimum risk, and demonstrate appropriate execution of these decisions.

Specifically, the definition of the term "hazard" as used in the Highway Transportation System will be taught. Students will learn the categories from which hazards are identified within the driving scene and learn the scanning techniques for identifying clues to potential hazards within the driving scene. Students will learn the skills to predict potential outcomes of hazards within the driving scene. They will learn the importance of making accurate decisions to minimize the risk of potential hazards. Students will learn the relationship between the physical process of executing the decision and the mental processes which preceded the action. They will learn the five possible actions a driver employs to execute decisions about changes in speed, lane position, and planned path of travel. Strategies used to implement the I.P.D.E. (identify, predict, decide, execute) process of defensive driving will be emphasized.

V. Students will be taught to understand the management of space requirements under all driving situations.

Specifically, they will learn about the relationship between the correct positioning of a vehicle and collision prevention. Discussions will be conducted regarding the techniques used to maintain a two-second interval of space between vehicles as well as situations when a two-second interval is not sufficient. Students will learn the disadvantages of following too closely as related to visibility, maneuverability, and stopping along with the actions that can be taken to reduce the possibilities of rear-end collisions. Students will learn the actions a driver can take to minimize the danger of oncoming traffic and the conditions that may cause the oncoming vehicle to cross the center line. Specific clues to look for when following vehicles that alert the driver to reduce speed and implement the I.P.D.E. requirements for a safe following distance will be covered. The use of "compromising" as a strategy for maintaining lateral space will be reviewed as well.

VI. Students will learn procedures required to effectively control and take proper actions in emergency situations.

Specifically, they will learn the two sources of driving emergencies, the actions to take if any of the following occurs: (1) the brakes or the steering system should fail, (2) if forward vision becomes blocked, (3) if a tire has a blowout, (4) if the accelerator sticks, (5) if the vehicle catches fire, (6) if there is vehicle power failure, (7) if experiencing loss of traction, (8) the recovery action to take if the vehicle runs off the road, (9) the actions a driver may take to avoid a head-on crash and (10) how to avoid a side-impact collision and minimize the effects of a collision.

VII. Students will lean measures necessary to correct and minimize the effects of temporary or permanent physical defects or limitations.

Specifically, they will learn how temporary or permanent disabilities affect a person's abilities to perform the I.P.D.E. steps of the driving task, the visual abilities a driver must possess and how each applies to the various driving environments. Students will learn how a driver can compensate for impairments in visual acuity, peripheral vision, depth perception, color vision, glare recovery, and hearing. The characteristics of carbon monoxide and the ways carbon monoxide might enter a vehicle's driving compartment as well as symptoms and appropriate first aid regarding carbon monoxide poisoning will be covered.

VIII. Students will learn their legal and moral responsibilities at the scene of highway collisions.

Specifically, they will learn what Florida laws require of drivers involved in traffic collisions and the legal and moral responsibilities a person should assume at the scene of traffic collisions. Discussion will be centered on what actions may be used to assist injured victims at the scene of traffic collisions and the step-by-step procedures to follow at the scene of a traffic collisions.

IX The student will learn how attitudes and emotions affect driving decisions.

Specifically, they will learn how emotions may affect a person's ability to perform each I.P.D.E. step of the driving task and the physical changes that may occur when a person is affected by strong emotions. The emotions that most often impair driving will be identified and how they can affect driving performance and a driver's decision-making regarding risk acceptance. Students will learn some techniques that can be used to cope with emotions while driving. They will learn how passenger emotional maturity may affect a driver and some techniques that may be used to assist the driver. A comparison of personality traits of drivers who have a collision history verses those free of violations will be discussed.

X. Students will learn the importance of vehicle maintenance that promotes safe and efficient operation.

Specifically, they will learn the meaning and importance of preventive maintenance for car owners and how to identify and explain the functions of the different systems of an automobile. Identified will be the warning signs which indicate the need for repair, replacement, or maintenance of the different systems of a car. Students will learn the Florida laws regarding the responsibility of the motorist to keep their car in a safe-driving condition and ways to find competent mechanics to repair and maintain the car. Driving practices that can help reduce the amount of fuel used per mile and information regarding the various types of tires, how to maintain them, and rules for replacing them will be discussed.

XI. Students will learn about their responsibility to comply with laws which apply to drivers as well as owners of motor vehicles.

Specifically, they will learn the primary purpose of the requirements of driver licensing, the procedures and requirements for obtaining a restricted, regular, chauffeurs and motorcycle license in the State of Florida. The legal requirements for purchasing and selling a motor vehicle in Florida will be reviewed. Students will learn about the different types of vehicle insurance coverage and the Florida Financial Responsibility Law. Problems and responsibilities of vehicle ownership for a high school student will be discussed. Students will learn why traffic laws exist and what would happen if there were no traffic laws along with how the Florida point system for traffic law works. The relationship of natural laws and legislated laws regarding speed, following distance, and required vehicle equipment will be covered.

XII. Students will learn the principles and practices related to using a motor vehicle for a long trip.

They will learn about the important vehicle maintenance checks that should be executed along with the personal preparations that should be made prior to a long trip. They will learn what emergency equipment and supplies to take on a long trip. They will learn to use and to value a road map in trip planning. Factors to consider when selecting the safest, most convenient and least costly routes for short, long, and overnight trips will be covered. The proper way to load a car, truck trailer, motorcycle, and other recreational vehicles along with the precautions a driver should take when towing a trailer will be discussed.

XIII. Students will learn the basic operation and interaction of motorcycles and other two wheeled vehicles on the Highway Transportation System.

Specifically, they will learn the dual responsibility of drivers and motorcyclists as they operate together in traffic and the procedures a cyclist should follow while learning to drive. They will learn the importance of wearing apparel and equipment that protect a cyclist and safety rules and procedures for motorcycle passengers. Students will also learn how both the driver and cyclist can use the I.P.D.E. process for defensive strategies and tactics in traffic. The Florida laws relating to motorcycles, motor-driven cycles, and their operators will be discussed.

XIV. Students will learn about specific decisions to be made when interacting with other users of the Highway Transportation System beyond just the automobile.

Specifically, they will learn about the characteristics and special problems caused by trains and other vehicles on fixed tracks or courses. Problems and actions necessary to interact with non-motorized vehicles and pedestrians will also be discussed. Students will learn about the problems unique to commercial carriers and other vehicles of significant size and weight differences along with the action necessary to interact safely on the roadways.

XV. Students will learn about vehicle occupant restraints and other built-in safety features and devices.

Specifically, they will learn the Florida Laws that pertain to vehicle occupant restraints and their advantages which justify the use of vehicle occupant restraints. They will learn correct use of vehicle occupant restraint devices for all age and size passengers. The "force of impact" and factors that affect the "force of impact" in a collision will be discussed. Students will learn about "car crash" and the "passenger crash." The relationship between the increase in speed and "force of impact" applied to the natural law of kinetic energy and its effects on vehicle size, injury and survival rates in crashes will be discussed.

XVI. Students will learn about the need for actively supporting traffic law enforcement agencies and assisting in the improvement of highway safety programs.

Specifically, they will identify ways to encourage and support legislative efforts that affect traffic law. The enforcement agencies, local, state, and national programs and organizations that can be used to enhance highway safety will be identified. Methods by which the media can be used to influence public support for law enforcement and highway safety programs will be discussed.

XVII. Students must successfully complete the Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) course component within the driver education curriculum as prescribed in section 322.095, F.S.

Specifically, the Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) provides instruction on the physiological and psychological consequences of abuse of alcohol and other drugs, the societal and economic costs of alcohol and drug abuse, the effects of alcohol and drug abuse on the driver of a motor vehicle and the laws of the State, relating to the operation of a motor vehicle.

# OVERVIEW OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS' DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAM

Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) serve the students of Metropolitan Miami-Dade County, which includes the City of Miami, 27 outlying municipalities, and a large unincorporated area. M-DCPS has a total population of approximately 345,000 students, served by approximately 20,322 full-time teachers. This places M-DCPS as the fourth largest school district in the United States, and the largest school district in Florida. To more efficiently serve the needs of the 392 schools, the district is divided into four administrative regions supervised by Regional Centers.

Currently, driver education is offered in the district's traditional senior high schools. Driver education is offered numerous periods per day, five days per week. Depending on the school site, these classes have the option of being offered in the afternoon, immediately following the conclusion of the regularly scheduled school day, in the evening, or on Saturdays each trimester. Private school students, as well as public school students, whose senior high schools do not offer driver education, may enroll in these classes at no cost. Driver education is offered both semesters of the regular school year as a one semester, elective course.

# DRIVER EDUCATION CLASSROOM CURRICULUM

I. Students will be taught a basic knowledge of a Highway Transportation System (HTS), its purpose, major elements, effectiveness, and the roles by various components in the system.

Specifically, they will be able to identify the three major elements of the Highway Transportation System, how the success of each of the three major elements is dependent upon the other two and how to identify these methods by which the Highway Transportation System's effectiveness can be measured. They will be able to define the sub-systems that have been established to manage the Highway Transportation System and their purpose. The students will learn the economic and social consequences resulting from breakdowns in the Highway Transportation System and the "multiple causes" theory of collisions as well as the rationale for using the term "collision" rather than "accident". Students will compare age group collision statistics and identify ways to improve the records for each grouping.

II. Students will be taught methods of basic control of the vehicle and be able to demonstrate this basic skill. Included will be exterior and interior pre-driving checks, control of motion and direction, and basic maneuvers.

Specifically, they will be taught to execute exterior and interior pre-driving checks and the steps a driver should take in starting the engine. They will learn the standard identity and location of each item found on the instrument panel and describe its function. This will include the function of each device used for safety, visibility, communication, and comfort in a standard passenger vehicle, correct procedures for starting the engine, placing the vehicle in motion, and stopping it safely will be taught. They will be taught the techniques of proper steering for forward and reverse driving. They will learn the steps for making correct lane changes, and how to make a right and left turn at an intersection. The steps used to park a vehicle parallel, angled, and perpendicular to the curb or road way, will be covered as well. Students will learn the advantages and disadvantages for selecting maneuvers and procedures used in reversing the direction of a vehicle.

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They will learn about the important vehicle maintenance checks that should be executed along with the personal preparations that should be made prior to a long trip. They will learn what emergency equipment and supplies to take on a long trip. They will learn to use and to value a road map in trip planning. Factors to consider when selecting the safest, most convenient and least costly routes for short, long, and overnight trips will be covered. The proper way to load a car, truck, trailer, motorcycle, and other recreational vehicles along with the precautions a driver should take when towing a trailer will be discussed.

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve the attached Interlocal Agreement between the County and the Miami-Dade County School Board (School Board) for the provision of Drivers' Education by the School Board in the amount of \$2,519,619.35. This amount will be paid from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund (Trust Fund) available for the period of October 1, 2011 to September 30, 2012, and provides for payment in arrears for services rendered during that The significant increase in the amount requested from the previous year (which was period. \$388,095.00) is due to the School Board's decision to again provide Driver's Education programs in high schools as opposed to just their adult education facilities. Funding covers all costs associated with providing classroom and behind the wheel instruction to students at thirty-six public high schools throughout the County.

Scope

The impact of this item is countywide in nature as Driver's Education programs are provided in public schools throughout the County.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

There is no fiscal impact to the County with the approval of this item.

Pursuant to the Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act, 318.1215, Florida Statutes, effective October 1, 2002, the Board approved Ordinance No. 02-167 on September 24, 2002, creating the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund. The Ordinance also required the Clerk of the Court to collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty to be used to fund traffic education programs, and directed the Administration to develop selection procedures for adoption by the Board for the award of grants to Driver Education Programs.

Track Record/Monitor

Pursuant to resolutions R-618-03 and R-864-04, the Board approved selection procedures, including criteria, for the distribution of grants from the Trust Fund. To date, the School Board has been the only recipient of funding from the Trust Fund since FY 2003-2004. The Office of Management and Budget, Grants Coordination (OMB-GC) will be responsible for monitoring this Interlocal Agreement.

Background

The selection procedures for the Trust Fund require the County to advertise the availability of Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund grants and request letters of interest from qualified organizations. The adopted criteria require the following:

- grant funds support driver's education programs offered by a public school system or nonprofit private school;
- private driving schools established principally for the purpose of driver education are not eligible; curriculum must include behind the wheel experience;
- driver's education must be offered to private as well as public school students;
- grantee must agree to provide appropriate accountability and reporting procedures; and
- funds may not be used for administrative/overhead expenses.

The adopted procedures further require that if only one letter of interest from a qualified organization is received, then the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee will negotiate an agreement and submit it to the Board for approval. For this cycle, the School Board was the only eligible organization to submit a letter of interest.

# **AGREEMENT**

This Agreement made and entered into as of this \_\_\_\_\_\_\_ day of, \_\_\_\_\_\_ 2013, by and between Miami-Dade County, a political subdivision of the State of Florida (hereinafter referred to as "County"), having its principal office at 111 N.W. 1<sup>st</sup> Street, 19th Floor, Miami, Florida 33128 and the School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, hereinafter referred to as the "School Board", having its principal office at 1450 NE 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue, Miami, Florida 33132, states conditions and covenants for the rendering of Driver's Education services (hereinafter referred to as "Services") for the County.

WHEREAS, Section 318.1215, Florida Statutes, effective at the time Ordinance No. 02-167 was adopted, known as the "Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act" authorized the County to enact an ordinance requiring the clerk of the court to collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty to be used to fund traffic education programs in public and non-public schools; (the "Funds"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance No. 02-167, the Board of County Commissioners (the "Board") established the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund and directed the County Manager to develop selection procedures for adoption by the Board for the award of grants to Driver Education Programs; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution R-618-03 and R-864-04, the Board approved selection procedures for the distribution of funds to driver education programs from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund; and

WHEREAS, the County has allocated funds from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund to the School Board for the provision of Driver's Education,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants recorded herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

# ARTICLE 1. DEFINITIONS

The following words and expressions used in this Agreement shall be construed as follows, except when it is clear from the context that another meaning is intended:

- a) The words "Agreement" "Contract" or "Contract Documents" shall mean collectively these terms and conditions, the Scope of Services (Attachment A) and the Budget Documents (Attachment B) and all other attachments hereto, as well as all amendments or budget revisions issued hereto.
- b) The words "Contract Manager" shall mean Miami-Dade County's Director of the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") or the Director's designee, or the duly authorized representative designated to manage the Contract.
- c) The word "Days" shall mean Calendar Days, unless otherwise specifically noted.

- d) The word "Deliverables" shall mean all documentation and any items of any nature submitted by the Provider to the County's Contract Manager for review and approval pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.
- e) The words "directed", "required", "permitted", "ordered", "designated", "selected", "prescribed" or words of like import to mean respectively, the direction, requirement, permission, order, designation, selection or prescription of the County's Contract Manager; and similarly the words "approved", acceptable", "satisfactory", "equal", "necessary", or words of like import to mean respectively, approved by, or acceptable or satisfactory to, equal or necessary in the sole discretion of the County's Contract Manager.
- f) The words "Effective Term" shall mean the date on which this Agreement is effective, including start date and end date.
- g) The words "Extra Work" or "Change Order" or "Additional Work" shall mean resulting in additions or deletions or modifications to the amount, type or value of the Work and Services as required in this Agreement, as directed and/or approved by the County.
- h) "HIPAA" means Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996.
- i) The words "Scope of Services" shall mean the document appended hereto as Attachment A, which details the work to be performed by the Provider.
- j) The word "subcontractor" or "subconsultant" shall mean any person, entity, firm or corporation, other than the employees of the Provider, who furnishes labor and/or materials, in connection with the Work, whether directly or indirectly, on behalf and/or under the direction of the Provider and whether or not in privity of Agreement with the Provider.
- k) The words "Work", "Services" "Program", or "Project" shall mean all matters and things required to be done by the Provider in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 2. USE OF FUNDS AND AMOUNT PAYABLE. The School Board represents that it has provided driver's education services in accordance with the Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act (the "Act"), Section 318.1215, Florida Statutes, Ordinance No. 02-167, Resolution R-618-03, Resolution R-864-04, Resolution R-906-12, and Resolution R-\_\_\_\_\_, which are incorporated herein by reference.

Driver's Education provided under this Agreement must include behind the wheel experience. "Driver education services" shall include, but not be limited to, the items listed in Attachment A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference as if fully set forth herein, as amended from time to time by written modification of this Agreement. A modification to this Agreement shall only be effective after the modification is approved in writing by the County.

Funding under this Agreement shall be used to pay the Provider for Driver's Education Services rendered and support approved expenditures for the period October 1, 2011 to September 30, 2012.

Subject to available funds, the maximum provisional amount payable for services rendered under this contract shall not exceed:

**Driver's Education: \$2,519,619.35** 

Both parties agree that should, in the County's sole discretion, available County funding be reduced, the amount payable under this Contract may be proportionately reduced at the sole discretion and option of the County.

All services undertaken by the Provider before the County's execution of this Contract shall be at the Provider's risk and expense.

Both parties agree that this is a twelve month contract from the date of contract execution. Both parties expressly acknowledge funding under this contract is at the County's sole discretion.

It is the responsibility of the Provider to maintain sufficient financial resources to meet the expenses incurred during the period between the provision of services and payment by the County.

# ARTICLE 3. SCOPE OF SERVICES

The Provider shall render services in accordance with the Scope of Services incorporated herein and attached hereto as Attachment A and Attachment B, Driver Education Classroom Curriculum..

The Provider shall implement the Scope of Services as described in Attachment A and B in a manner deemed satisfactory to the County. Any modification or amendment to the Scope of Services and Curriculum shall not be effective until approved by the County and Provider in writing.

# ARTICLE 4. <u>BUDGET SUMMARY</u>

The Provider agrees that all expenditures or costs shall be made in accordance with the Budget, which is attached herein and incorporated hereto as Attachment C.

The Provider may shift funds between existing line items: 1) without a budget revision, if the change to the line item does not exceed fifteen percent (15%); or 2) with a budget revision requested by the Provider's President, Vice President, Executive Director, or other designated representative as stated on the Authorized Signature Form attached hereto, and approved by the OMB, if the changes to a line item exceed fifteen percent (15%). A budget revision is also required in order to add new line items.

PROHIBITED USE OF FUNDS. Funding under this Agreement <u>must not be used for administrative or overhead expenses</u>.

The Provider may request a budget revision to amend the budget no more than twice during the term of this Agreement. A request for a budget revision must be submitted to OMB no later than thirty (30) days prior to the expiration of this Agreement.

# ARTICLE 5. EFFECTIVE TERM

Both parties agree that the effective term of this Agreement shall commence on the date that this contract is fully executed and approved by the Board of County Commissioners and will terminate exactly twelve months later.

# ARTICLE 6. INDEMNIFICATION BY PROVIDER

- Government Entity. Government entity shall indemnify and hold harmless the A. County and its officers, employees, agents and instrumentalities from any and all liability, losses or damages, including attorneys' fees and costs of defense, which the County or its officers, employees, agents or instrumentalities may incur as a result of claims, demands, suits, causes of actions or proceedings of any kind or nature arising out of, relating to or resulting from the performance of this Agreement by the government entity or its employees, agents, servants, partners, principals or subcontractors. Government entity shall pay all claims and losses in connection therewith and shall investigate and defend all claims, suits or actions of any kind or nature in the name of the County, where applicable, including appellate proceedings, and shall pay all costs, judgments, and attorney's fees which may issue thereon. Provided, however, this indemnification shall only be to the extent and within the limitations of Section 768.28, Fla. Stat., subject to the provisions of that Statute, as may be amended, whereby the government entity shall not be held liable to pay a personal injury or property damage claim or judgment by a party which exceeds the statutory cap for personal injury or property damage claims, liabilities, losses or causes of action which may arise as a result of the negligence of the government entity. Provider expressly understands and agrees that any insurance protection required by this Agreement or otherwise provided by Provider or self-insurance shall in no way limit the responsibility to indemnify, keep and save harmless and defend the County or its officers, employees, agents and instrumentalities as herein provided.
- B. All Other Providers. Provider shall indemnify and hold harmless the County and its officers, employees, agents and instrumentalities from any and all liability, losses or damages, including attorneys' fees and costs of defense, which the County or its officers, employees, agents or instrumentalities may incur as a result of claims, demands, suits, causes of actions or proceedings of any kind or nature arising out of, relating to or resulting from the performance of this Agreement by the Provider or its employees, agents, servants, partners principals or subcontractors. Provider shall pay all claims and losses in connection therewith and shall investigate and defend all claims, suits or actions of any kind or nature in the name of the County, where applicable, including appellate proceedings, and shall pay all costs, judgments, and attorney's fees which may issue thereon. Provider expressly understands and agrees that any insurance protection required by this Agreement or otherwise provided by Provider shall in no way limit the responsibility to indemnify, keep and save harmless and defend the County or its officers, employees, agents and instrumentalities as herein provided.
- C. **Term of Indemnification.** The provisions of Article 6 shall survive the expiration or termination of this Contract.

# ARTICLE 7. INSURANCE

If the total dollar value of all County contracts with the Provider exceeds \$25,000 then the following insurance coverage is required:

A. Government Entity. If the Provider is the State of Florida or an agency or political subdivision of the State as defined by section 768.28, Florida Statutes, the Provider shall furnish the County, upon request, written verification of liability protection in accordance with section 768.28, Florida Statutes. Nothing herein shall be construed to extend any party's liability beyond that provided in section 768.28, Florida Statutes. The provider shall also furnish the County, upon request, written verification of Workers Compensation protection in accordance with Florida Statutes, Chapter 440.

# ARTICLE 8. PROOF OF LICENSURE AND BACKGROUND SCREENING

A. <u>Licensure</u>. If the Provider is required by the State of Florida or Miami-Dade County or any law or regulation to be licensed or certified to provide the services or operate the facilities outlined in the Scope of Services (Attachment A), the Provider shall furnish to the County a copy of all required current licenses or certificates. Examples of services or operations requiring such licensure or certification include but are not limited to childcare, day care, nursing homes, and boarding homes.

If the Provider fails to furnish the County with the licenses or certificates required under this Section, the County shall not disburse any funds until it is provided with such licenses or certificates. Failure to provide the licenses or certificates within sixty (60) days of execution of this Agreement may result in termination of this Agreement at the County's discretion.

B. <u>Background Screening</u>. The Provider agrees to comply with all applicable laws, regulations, ordinances, and resolutions regarding background screening of employees and subcontractors. Provider's failure to comply with any applicable laws, regulations, ordinances, and resolutions regarding background screening of employees and subcontractors is grounds for a material breach and termination of this contract at the sole discretion of the County.

The Provider agrees to comply with all applicable laws (including but not limited to Chapters 39, 402, 409, 394, 408, 393, 397, 984, 985 and 435, Florida Statutes, as may be amended form time to time), regulations, ordinances and resolutions, regarding background screening of those who may work or volunteer with vulnerable persons, as defined by section 435.02. Florida Statutes, as may be amended from time to time.

In the event criminal background screening is required by law, the State of Florida and/or the County, the Provider will permit only employees, subcontractors, and volunteers with a satisfactory national criminal background check through an appropriate screening agency (i.e., the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, Florida Department of Law Enforcement or Federal Bureau of Investigation) to work or volunteer in direct contact with vulnerable persons.

The Provider agrees to ensure that employees, volunteers and subcontracted personnel who work or volunteer with vulnerable persons satisfactorily complete and pass Level 2 background screening before working with vulnerable persons. Provider shall furnish the County with proof that employees, volunteers and subcontracted personnel, who work or volunteer with vulnerable persons, satisfactorily passed Level 2 background screening, pursuant to Chapter 435, Florida Statutes, as may be amended from time to time.

If the Provider fails to furnish to the County proof that an employee, volunteer or subcontractor's Level 2 background screening was satisfactorily passed and completed prior to that employee, volunteer or subcontractor volunteering or working with a vulnerable person or

vulnerable persons, the County shall not disburse any further funds and this Contract may be subject to termination at the sole discretion of the County.

# ARTICLE 9. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- A. The Provider agrees to abide by and be governed by Miami-Dade County Ordinance No. 72-82 (Conflict of Interest Ordinance codified at Section 2-11.1 et al. of the Code of Miami-Dade County), as amended, which is incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth herein, in connection with its contract obligations hereunder.
- B. No person under the employ of the COUNTY, who exercises any function or responsibilities in connection with this Agreement, has at the time this Agreement is entered into, or shall have during the term of this Agreement, any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement.
- C. No person, including but not limited to any officer, board of directors, manager, or supervisor employed by the Provider, who is in the position of authority, and who exercises any function or responsibilities in connection with this Agreement, has at the time this Agreement is entered into, or shall have during the term of this Agreement, received any of the services, or direct or instruct any employee under their supervision to provide such services as described in the Agreement. Notwithstanding the before mentioned provision, any officer, board of directors, manager or supervisor employed by the Provider, who is eligible to receive any of the services described herein may utilize such services if he or she can demonstrate that he or she does not have direct supervisory responsibility over the Provider's employee(s) or service program.
- D. In accordance with County Ordinance No. 08-113, and the Code of Miami-Dade County Section 2-8.1.1, collusion in bidding for County contracts is prohibited. Two (2) or more related parties shall be presumed collusive if each submits a bid or proposal for any County purchases of supplies, materials and services (including professional services, other than professional architectural, engineering and other services subject to Sec. 2-10.4 and Sec. 287.055 Florida Statutes), lease, permit, concession or management agreements regardless of the value of the contract being solicited. The Provider is required to submit an affidavit (see Attachment C of this Agreement) regarding their relation to other bidders for similar purchases or services, except those excluded from this provision.

# ARTICLE 10. <u>CIVIL RIGHTS</u>

The Provider agrees to abide by Chapter 11A of the Code of Miami-Dade County ("County Code"), as amended, which prohibits discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, sex, familial status, marital status, sexual orientation, pregnancy, age, ancestry, national origin or handicap; Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, as amended, which prohibits discrimination in employment and public accommodation; the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, 42 U.S.C. §6101, as amended, which prohibits discrimination and public discrimination in employment because of age; the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, 29 U.S.C. §794, as amended, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability; the Americans with Disabilities Act, 42 U.S.C. §12101 et seq., which prohibits discrimination in employment and public accommodations because of disability; the Federal Transit Act, 49 U.S.C. §1612, as amended; and the Fair Housing Act, 42 U.S.C. §3601 et seq. It is expressly

understood that the Provider must submit an affidavit attesting that it is not in violation of the Acts. If the Provider or any owner, subsidiary, or other firm affiliated with or related to the Provider is found by the responsible enforcement agency, the Courts or the County to be in violation of these acts, the County will conduct no further business with the Provider.

Any contract entered into based upon a false affidavit shall be voidable by the County. If the Provider violates any of the Acts during the term of any contract the Provider has with the County, such contract shall be voidable by the County, even if the Provider was not in violation at the time it submitted its affidavit.

The Provider agrees that it is in compliance with the Domestic Violence Leave, codified as § 11A-60 et seq. of the Miami-Dade County Code, which requires an employer, who in the regular course of business has fifty (50) or more employees working in Miami-Dade County for each working day during each of twenty (20) or more calendar work weeks to provide domestic violence leave to its employees.

Failure to comply with this local law may be grounds for voiding or terminating this Agreement or for commencement of debarment proceedings against Provider.

# ARTICLE 11. NOTICE REQUIREMENTS

It is understood and agreed between the parties that any written notice addressed to OMB, which is delivered by U.S. Mail or emailed to OMB and any written notice addressed to the Provider, which is delivered by U.S. Mail or by email shall constitute sufficient notice to either party.

All notices required or permitted under this Agreement which are delivered by U.S. Mail shall be deemed sufficiently served if delivered by Registered or Certified Mail, with return receipt requested; or delivered personally; or delivered via fax or by email. All notices to the County shall be delivered to the following address:

Either party may at any time designate a different mail or email address and/or contact person by giving written notice as provided above to the other party.

# ARTICLE 12. AUTONOMY

Both parties agree that this Agreement recognizes the autonomy of the contracting parties and implies no affiliation between the contracting parties. It is expressly understood and intended that the Provider is only a recipient of funding support and is not an agent or instrumentality of the County. Furthermore, the Provider's agents and employees are not agents or employees of the County.

# ARTICLE 13. SURVIVAL

The parties acknowledge that any of the obligations in this agreement, including but not limited to Provider's obligation to indemnify the County, will survive the term, termination, and cancellation hereof. Accordingly, the respective obligations of the Provider under this agreement, which by nature would continue beyond the termination, cancellation or expiration thereof, shall survive termination, cancellation or expiration hereof.

# ARTICLE 14. BREACH OF AGREEMENT: COUNTY REMEDIES

Breach. A breach by the Provider shall have occurred under this Agreement if: (1) the Provider fails to provide the services outlined in the Scope of Services (Attachment A) within the effective term of this Agreement; (2) the Provider ineffectively or improperly uses the County funds allocated under this Agreement; (3) the Provider does not furnish the Certificates of Insurance required by this Agreement or as determined by the County's Risk Management Division; (4) if applicable, the Provider does not furnish upon request by the County proof of licensure/certification or proof of background screening required by this Agreement; (5) the Provider fails to submit, or submits incorrect or incomplete, proof of expenditures to support disbursement requests or advance funding disbursements or fails to submit or submits incomplete or incorrect detailed reports of expenditures or final expenditure reports; (6) the Provider does not submit or submits incomplete or incorrect required reports; (7) the Provider refuses to allow the County access to records or refuses to allow the County to monitor, evaluate and review the Provider's program; (8) the Provider discriminates under any of the laws outlined in Article 10 of this Agreement; (9) the Provider, attempts to meet its obligations under this Agreement through fraud, misrepresentation, or material misstatement; (10) the Provider fails to correct deficiencies found during a monitoring, evaluation, or review within the specified time as described and defined in a Corrective Action Plan (CAP); (11) the Provider fails to issue prompt payments to small business subcontractors or follow dispute resolution procedures regarding a disputed payment; (12) the Provider fails to submit the Certificate of Corporate Status, Board of Directors requirement, or proof of tax status; and (13) the Provider fails to fulfill in a timely and proper manner any and all of its obligations, covenants, agreements, and stipulations in this Agreement.; (14) the Provider fails to meet any of the terms and conditions of the Miami-Dade County Vendor Affidavits (Attachment E) or the State Affidavit (Attachment F); or (15) the Provider fails to fulfill in a timely and proper manner any and all of its obligations, covenants, agreements and stipulations in this Contract. Waiver of breach of any provisions of this Contract shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other breach and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of this Agreement.

- B. **County Remedies.** If the Provider breaches this Agreement, the County may pursue any or all of the following remedies:
- 1. The County may terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to the Provider of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof. In the event of termination, the County may: (a) request the return of all finished or unfinished documents, data studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, photographs, reports prepared and secured by the Provider with County funds under this Agreement (b) seek reimbursement of County funds allocated to the Provider under this Agreement; (c) terminate or cancel any other contracts entered into between the County and the Provider. The Provider shall be responsible for all direct and indirect costs associated with such termination, including attorney's fees;
- 2. The County may suspend payment in whole or in part under this Agreement by providing written notice to the Provider of such suspension and specifying the effective date thereof, at least five (5) days before the effective date of suspension. If payments are suspended, the County shall specify in writing the actions that must be taken by the Provider as condition precedent to resumption of payments and shall specify a reasonable date for compliance. The County may also suspend any payments in whole or in part under any other contracts entered into between the County and the Provider. The Provider shall be responsible for all direct and indirect costs associated with such suspension, including attorney's fees up to the provisions as detailed in Florida Statute §768.28;
- 3. The County may seek enforcement of this Agreement including but not limited to filing an action in a court of appropriate jurisdiction. The Provider shall be responsible for all direct and indirect costs associated with such enforcement, including attorney's fees;
  - 4. The County may debar the Provider from future County contracting;
- 5. If, for any reason, the Provider should attempt to meet its obligations under this Agreement through fraud, misrepresentation or material misstatement, the County shall, whenever practicable terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to the provider of such termination and specifying the effective date thereof at least five (5) days before the effective date of such termination. The County may terminate or cancel any other contracts which such individual or entity has with the County. Such individual or entity shall be responsible for all direct and indirect costs associated with such termination or cancellation, including attorney's fees. Any individual or entity who attempts to meet its contractual obligations with the County through fraud, misrepresentation, or material misstatement may be debarred from county contracting for up to five (5) years;
  - 6. Any other remedy available at law or equity.
- C. Authorization to Terminate Agreement. The Mayor or the Mayor's designee is authorized to terminate this Agreement on behalf of the County.

- D. Failures or waivers to insist on strict performance of any covenant, condition, or provision of this Contract by the County shall not be deemed a waiver of any rights or remedies, nor shall it relieve the Provider from performing any subsequent obligations strictly in accordance with the term of this Contract. No waiver shall be effective unless in writing and signed by the parties. Such waiver shall be limited to provisions of this Contract specifically referred to therein and shall not be deemed a waiver of any other provision. No waiver shall constitute a continuing waiver unless the writing states otherwise.
- E. Damages Sustained. Notwithstanding the above, the Provider shall not be relieved of liability to the County for damages sustained by the County by virtue of any breach of the Agreement, and the County may withhold any payments to the Provider until such time as the exact amount of damages due the County is determined. The County may also pursue any remedies available at law or equity to compensate for any damages sustained by the breach. The Provider shall be responsible for all direct and indirect costs associated with such action, including attorney's fees subject to the limitations stated in Florida Statute §768.28.

# ARTICLE 15. TERMINATION BY EITHER PARTY

Both parties agree that this Agreement may be terminated by either party hereto by written notice to the other party of such intent to terminate at least thirty (30) days prior to the effective date of such termination. The Mayor or the Mayor's designee is authorized to terminate this Agreement on the behalf of the County.

# ARTICLE 16. PAYMENT PROCEDURES

The County agrees to pay the Provider for services rendered under this Agreement based on the payment schedule, the line item budget, or both, which are incorporated herein and attached hereto as Attachment C. Payment shall be made in accordance with procedures outlined below and if applicable, the Sherman S. Winn Prompt Payment Ordinance (Ordinance 94-40).

- A. <u>Reimbursement and Advances</u>. The parties agree that this is a cost-basis Agreement and that the Provider shall be paid through reimbursement payment based on the budget approved under this Contract (See Attachment C) and when **complete and proper documentation** of service delivery and incurred expenses are provided to the County and approved by the County.
- B. Monies Owed to the County. The County reserves the right, in its sole discretion, to reduce payments to the Provider in order to recapture any monies owed to the County. In accordance with County Administrative Order No. 3-29, the Provider that is in arrears to the County is prohibited from obtaining new County contracts or extensions of contracts until such time as the arrearage has been paid in full or the County has agreed in writing to an approved payment plan.
- C. **No Payment of Subcontractors.** In no event shall County funds be advanced or paid by the County directly to any subcontractor hereunder. Payment to approved subcontractors shall be made by Provider following requirements and limitations as detailed in Article 20 of this Agreement.
- D. Requests for Payment. The County agrees to pay all budgeted costs incurred by the Provider that are allowable under the County guidelines. In order to receive payment for

allowable costs, the Provider shall submit a Summary of Expenditures Report and a Performance Report detailing the number of students who received Driver's Education and the number of hours of Driver's Education that were provided. The Summary of Expenditures Report shall reflect the expenses incurred by the Provider for services rendered and documented in the Performance Report. Upon submission of satisfactory required reports, the OMB shall make payment.

The County will not approve payments for in-kind or volunteer services provided by the Provider on behalf of the project. The OMB shall accept originals of invoices, receipts and other evidence of indebtedness as proof of expenditures. When original documents cannot be produced, the Provider must adequately justify their absence in writing and furnish copies as proof of the expenditures.

E. Processing the Request for Payment. After the OMB staff reviews and approves the payment request, the OMB will submit a payment request to the County's Finance Department. The County's Finance Department will issue payment via Automated Clearing House (ACH) or mail the check directly to the Provider at the address listed in Article 11 of this Agreement, unless otherwise directed by the Provider in writing. The parties agree that the processing of a payment request from date of submission by the Provider shall take a maximum of forty-five (45) days from receipt of a complete and accurate payment request, pursuant to the County's Sherman S. Winn Prompt Payment Ordinance (Ordinance 94-40), Section 2-8.1.4 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Administrative Order No. 3-19, and the Florida Prompt Payment Act, if supporting documentation/invoices are properly documented as determined by the County in its sole discretion. It is the responsibility of the Provider to maintain sufficient financial resources to meet the expenses incurred during the period between the provision of services and payment by the County.

Failure to submit reimbursement requests with supporting documentation in a manner deemed correct and acceptable by the County shall be considered a breach of this Agreement and may result in termination of this Agreement.

- F. Final Request for Payment. A final request for payment from the Provider will be accepted by the OMB up to thirty (30) days after the expiration of this Agreement. If the Provider fails to comply, all rights to payment shall be forfeited. The request for the final payment may include accruals of the personnel costs listed in Attachment C, which the Provider is obligated to pay after the close of the period for services provided within the term of the Agreement.
- G. Closeout Reporting Process/Recapture of Funds. Upon the expiration of this Contract, the Provider shall submit Closeout Report documents to the OMB no more than thirty (30) days after the expiration of this Contract. These documents shall include a cumulative contract year-end summary of Provider's program performance, the Contract Year-End Closeout Report, and the Property Inventory Report. If after receipt of these documents, the OMB determines that the Provider has been paid funds not in accordance with the Contract, and to which it is not entitled, the Provider shall return such funds to the County or submit appropriate documentation. The County shall have the sole discretion in determining whether the Provider is entitled to such funds and the County's decision on this matter shall be binding. Additionally, any unexpended or unallocated funds shall be recaptured by the County.

# ARTICLE 17. PROHIBITED USE OF FUNDS

- A. Adverse Actions or Proceeding. The Provider shall not utilize County funds to retain legal counsel for any action or proceeding against the County or any of its agents, instrumentalities, employees, or officials. The Provider shall not utilize County funds to provide legal representation, advice, or counsel to any client in any action or proceeding against the County or any of its agents, instrumentalities, employees, or officials.
  - B. Religious Purposes. County funds shall not be used for religious purposes.
- C. Commingling Funds. The Provider shall not commingle funds provided under this Agreement with funds received from any other funding sources. The Provider shall establish a separate account exclusively for receipt of the funds received pursuant to this Agreement.
- D. Administrative Costs. The Provider shall not use these funds for any administrative and/or indirect costs.

# ARTICLE 18. REQUIRED DOCUMENTS, RECORDS, REPORTS, AUDITS, MONITORING AND REVIEW

- A. Certificate of Corporate Status. The Provider must submit to the OMB, within thirty (30) days from the date of execution of this Agreement, a certificate of corporate status in the name of the Provider, which certifies the following: that the Provider is organized under the laws of the State of Florida; that all fees and penalties have been paid; that the Providers most recent annual report has been filed; that its status is active; and that the Provider has not filed Articles of Dissolution.
- B. Proof of Tax Status. The Provider is required to submit to the County the following documentation: (a) The I.R.S. tax exempt status determination letter; (b) the most recent I.R.S. form 990; (c) the annual submission of I.R.S. form 990 within (6) months after the Provider's fiscal year end; (d) IRS form 941 Quarterly Federal Tax Return Reports within thirty-five (35) days after the quarter ends and if the form 941 reflects a tax liability, proof of payment must be submitted within forty-five (45) days after the quarter ends.
- C. Business Application. The Provider shall be a registered vendor with the County's Department of Procurement Management, for the duration of this Agreement. It is the responsibility of the Provider to file the appropriate Vendor Application and to update the Application file for any changes for the duration of this Agreement, including any option years.
- D. Section 2-11.1(d) of Miami-Dade County Code as amended by Ordinance 00-1, requires any county employee or any member of the employee's immediate family who has a controlling financial interest, direct or indirect, with Miami-Dade County or any person or agency acting for Miami-Dade County from competing or applying for any such contract as it pertains to this solicitation, must first request a conflict of interest opinion from the County's Ethic Commission prior to their or their immediate family member's entering into any contract or transacting any business through a firm, corporation, partnership or business entity in which the employee or any member of the employee's immediate family has a controlling financial interest, direct or indirect, with Miami-Dade County or any person or agency acting for Miami-Dade County and that any such contract, agreement or business engagement entered in

violation of this subsection, as amended, shall render this Agreement voidable. For additional information, please contact the Ethics Commission hotline at (305) 579-9093.

- E. Accounting Records. The Provider shall keep accounting records which conform to generally accepted accounting principles. All such records will be retained by the Provider for not less than five (5) years beyond the term of this Agreement, and shall be made available for review upon request from County authorized personnel.
- F. Financial Audit. If the Provider has or is required to have an annual certified public accountants opinion and related financial statements, the Provider agrees to provide these documents to the OMB no later than one hundred eighty (180) days following the end of the Provider's fiscal year, for each year during which this Agreement remains in force or until all funds received pursuant to this Agreement have been so audited, whichever is later.
- G. Access to Records: Audit. The County reserves the right to require the Provider to submit to an audit by an auditor of the County's choosing or approval. The Provider shall provide access to all of its records which relate to this Agreement at its place of business during regular business hours. The Provider agrees to provide such assistance as may be necessary to facilitate their review or audit by the County to insure compliance with applicable accounting and financial standards.
- H. Quarterly Reviews of Expenditures and Records. The County Commission Auditor may perform quarterly reviews of Provider expenditures and records. Subsequent payments to the provider shall be subject to a satisfactory review of Provider records and expenditures by the County Commission Auditor, including but not limited to, review of supporting documentation for expenditures and the existence of sufficient documentation to support eligible expenditures. The Provider agrees to reimburse the County for ineligible expenditures as determined by the County Commission Auditor.
- I. Quality Assurance / Recordkeeping. The Provider shall maintain, and shall require that the Provider's subcontractors and suppliers maintain, complete and accurate program and fiscal records to substantiate compliance with the requirements set forth in the Attachment A, Scope of Services, of this Agreement. The Provider and its subcontractors and suppliers, shall retain such records, and all other documents relevant to the Services furnished under this Agreement for a period of five (5) years from the expiration date of this Agreement.

The Provider agrees to participate in evaluation studies, quality management activities, Corrective Action Plan activities, and analyses carried out by or on behalf of the County to evaluate the effectiveness of client service(s) or the appropriateness and quality of care/service delivery. Accordingly, the Provider shall permit authorized staff involved in such efforts the right of access to the Provider's premises and records

- J. Confidentiality Requirements. The Provider shall establish and implement policies and procedures that ensure compliance with the following security standards and any and all applicable State and Federal statutes and regulations for the protection of confidential client records and electronic exchange of confidential information. The policies and procedures must ensure that:
  - (1) There is a controlled and secure area for storing and maintaining active confidential information and files, including but not limited to medical records;

- (2) Confidential records are not removed from the Provider's premises, unless otherwise authorized by law or upon written consent from the County;
- (3) Access to confidential information is restricted to authorized personnel of the Provider, the County, and/or the United States Office of the Inspector General;
- (4) Records are not left unattended in areas accessible to unauthorized individuals:
- (5) Access to electronic data is controlled;
- (6) Written authorization, signed by the client, is obtained for release of copies of client records and/or information. Original documents must remain on file at the originating provider site;
- (7) An orientation is provided to new staff persons, employees, and volunteers. All employees and volunteers must sign a confidentiality pledge, acknowledging their awareness and understanding of confidentiality laws, regulations, and policies;
- (8) Procedures are developed and implemented that address client chart and medical record identification, filing methods, storage, retrieval, organization and maintenance, access and security, confidentiality, retention, release of information, copying, and faxing.
- K. Monitoring: Management Evaluation and Performance Review. This section shall pertain only to Providers whose funding allocation under this Agreement is \$10,000 or more or whose funding allocation becomes \$10,000 or more during the term of this Agreement.

The Provider agrees to permit County authorized personnel to monitor, review and evaluate the program/work which is the subject of this Agreement. The OMB shall monitor both fiscal and programmatic compliance with all the terms and conditions of the Agreement. The Provider shall permit the OMB to conduct site visits, client assessment surveys, and other techniques deemed reasonably necessary to fulfill the monitoring function. A report of the OMB's findings will be delivered to the Provider and the Provider will rectify all deficiencies cited within the period of time specified in the report. If such deficiencies are not corrected within the specified time, the County may suspend payments or terminate this Agreement. The OMB may conduct one or more formal management evaluation and performance reviews of the Provider. Continuation of this Agreement or future funding is dependent upon satisfactory evaluation conclusions by the County.

- L. Client Records. The Provider shall maintain a separate individual client chart for each client/family served, where appropriate. This client chart shall include all pertinent information regarding case activity. These client charts shall be subject to the audit and inspection requirements under Article 19, Section G of this Agreement.
- M. Disaster Plan/Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP). The Provider shall develop and maintain an Agency Disaster Plan/COOP. At a minimum, the Plan will describe

how the Provider establishes and maintains an effective response to emergencies and disasters, and must comply with any Emergency Management related Florida Statutes applicable to the Provider. The Disaster Plan/COOP must be submitted to the OMB no later than January 1<sup>st</sup> of the contract term and is also subject to review and approval of the County in its sole discretion. The Provider will review the Plan annually, revise it as needed, and maintain a written copy on file at the Provider's site.

# ARTICLE 19. Office of Miami-Dade County Inspector General and the Commission Auditor

The Provider understands that it may be subject to an audit, random or otherwise, by the Office of Miami-Dade County Inspector General or an Independent Private Sector Inspector General retained by the Office of the Inspector General, or the County Commission Auditor.

Independent Private Sector Inspector General Reviews. The attention of the Provider is hereby directed to the requirements of Miami-Dade County Code Section 2-1076; in that the Office of the Miami-Dade County Inspector General (IG) shall have the authority and power to review past, present and proposed County programs, accounts, records, contracts and transactions. The IG shall have the power to subpoena witnesses, administer oaths and require the production of records. Upon ten (10) days written notice to the Provider from IG, the Provider shall make all requested records and documents available to the IG for inspection and copying.

The IG shall have the power to report and/or recommend to the Board of County Commissioners whether a particular project, program, contract or transaction is or was necessary and, if deemed necessary, whether the method used for implementing the project or program is or was efficient both financially and operationally. Monitoring of an existing project or program may include reporting whether the project is on time, within budget and in conformity with plans, specifications, and applicable law. The IG shall have the power to analyze the need for, and reasonableness of, proposed change orders.

The IG may, on a random basis, perform audits on all County contracts throughout the duration of said contract (hereinafter "random audits"). This random audit is separate and distinct from any other audit by the County. To pay for the functions of the Office of the Inspector General, any and all payments to be made to the Provider under this contract will be assessed one quarter (1/4) of one percent of the total amount of the payment, to be deducted from each progress payment as the same becomes due unless this Contract is federally or state funded where federal or state law or regulations preclude such a charge. The Provider shall in stating its agreed prices be mindful of this assessment, which will not be separately identified, calculated or adjusted in the proposed budget form.

The IG shall have the power to retain and coordinate the services of an independent private sector inspector general (IPSIG) who may be engaged to perform said random audits, as well as audit, investigate, monitor, oversee, inspect, and review the operations, activities and performance and procurement process including, but not limited to, project design, establishment of bid specifications, bid submittals, activities of the contractor, its officers, agents and employees, lobbyists, County staff and elected officials in order to ensure compliance with contract specifications and detect corruption and fraud.

Nothing in this Agreement shall impair any independent right of the County to conduct audit or investigative activities. The provisions of this section are neither intended nor shall they be construed to impose any liability on the County by the Provider or third parties.

## ARTICLE 20. SUBCONTRACTORS and ASSIGNMENTS

- A. **Subcontracts.** The parties agree that no assignment or subcontract will be made or let in connection with this Agreement without the prior written approval of the OMB in its sole discretion, which shall not be unreasonably withheld, and that all subcontractors or assignees shall be governed by all of the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
  - 1) If the Provider will cause any part of this Agreement to be performed by a Subcontractor, the provisions of this Agreement will apply to such Subcontractor and its officers, agents and employees in all respects as if it and they were employees of the Provider; and the Provider will not be in any manner thereby discharged from its obligations and liabilities hereunder, but will be liable hereunder for all acts and negligence of the Subcontractor, its officers, agents, and employees, as if they were employees of the Provider. The services performed by the Subcontractor will be subject to the provisions hereof as if performed directly by the Provider.
  - The Provider, before making any subcontract for any portion of the services, will state in writing to the County the name of the proposed Subcontractor, the portion of the Services which the Subcontractor is to perform, the place of business of such Subcontractor, and such other information as the County may require. The County will have the right to require the Provider not to award any subcontract to a person, firm, or corporation disapproved by the County in its sole discretion.
  - 3) Before entering into any subcontract hereunder, the Provider will inform the Subcontractor fully and completely of all provisions and requirements of this Agreement relating either directly or indirectly to the Services to be performed. Such Services performed by such Subcontractor will strictly comply with the requirements of this Agreement.
  - In order to qualify as a Subcontractor satisfactory to the County in its sole discretion, in addition to the other requirements herein provided, the Subcontractor must be prepared to prove to the satisfaction of the County that it has the necessary facilities, skill and experience, and ample financial resources to perform the Services in a satisfactory manner. To be considered skilled and experienced, the Subcontractor must show to the satisfaction of the County in its sole discretion that it has satisfactorily performed services of the same general type which is required to be performed under this Agreement.
  - The County shall have the right to withdraw its consent to a subcontract if it appears to the County that the subcontract will delay, prevent, or otherwise impair the performance of the Contractor's obligations under this Agreement. All Subcontractors are required to protect the confidentiality of the County's and County's proprietary and confidential information. Provider shall furnish to the County copies of all subcontracts between Provider and Subcontractors and suppliers hereunder. Within each such subcontract, there shall be a clause for the benefit of the County permitting the County to request completion of

performance by the Subcontractor of its obligations under the subcontract, in the event the County finds the Contractor in breach of its obligations, the option to pay the Subcontractor directly for the performance by such subcontractor. Notwithstanding, the foregoing shall neither convey nor imply any obligation or liability on the part of the County to any subcontractor hereunder as more fully described herein.

- B. If this Agreement involves the expenditure of \$100,000 or more by the County and the Provider intends to use subcontractors to provide the services listed in the Scope of Service (Attachment A) or suppliers to supply the materials, the Provider shall provide the names of the subcontractors and suppliers on the form attached as Attachment H. Provider agrees that it will not change or substitute subcontractors or suppliers from those listed in Attachment I without prior written approval of the County.
- C. Prompt Payments to Subcontractors. The Provider shall issue prompt payments to subcontractors that are small businesses (annual gross sales of \$750,000 or less with its principal place of business in Miami-Dade County) and shall have a dispute resolution procedure in place to address disputed payments. Pursuant to the County's Sherman S. Winn Prompt Payment Ordinance (Ordinance 94-40), Section 2-8.1.4 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, Administrative Order No. 3-19, and the Florida Prompt Payment Act, payments must be made within the time frame specified by applicable law. Failure to issue prompt payments to small business subcontractors or adhere to dispute resolution procedures may be grounds for suspension or termination of this Agreement or debarment.

## ARTICLE 21. LOCAL, STATE, AND FEDERAL COMPLIANCE REQUIREMENTS

Provider agrees to comply, subject to applicable professional standards, with the provisions of any and all applicable Federal, State and the County orders, statutes, ordinances, the rules and regulations which may pertain to the Services required under this Agreement, including but not limited to:

- a) Miami-Dade County Florida, Department of Business Development Participation Provisions, as applicable to this Agreement.
- b) Miami-Dade County Code, Chapter 11A, Article 3. All Providers and subcontractors performing work in connection with this Agreement shall provide equal opportunity for employment and services without regard to race, creed, religion, color, sex, familial status, marital status, sexual orientation, pregnancy, age, ancestry, national origin or handicap. The aforesaid provision shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer, recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Provider agrees to post in a conspicuous place available for employees and applicants for employment, such notices as may be required by the Dade County Equal Opportunity Board or other authority having jurisdiction over the work setting forth the provisions of the nondiscrimination law.
- c) "Conflicts of Interest" Section 2-11 of the Code of Miami-Dade County, and Ordinance 01-199.
- d) Miami-Dade County Code Section 10-38 "Debarment".

- e) Miami-Dade County Ordinance 99-5, codified at 11A-60 et. seq. Code of Miami-Dade County pertaining to complying with the County's Domestic Leave Ordinance. Failure to comply with this local law may be grounds for voiding or terminating this Agreement or for commencement of debarment proceedings against Provider.
- f) Miami-Dade County Ordinance 99-152, prohibiting the presentation, maintenance, or prosecution of false or fraudulent claims against Miami-Dade County.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, Provider shall not be required pursuant to this Agreement to take any action or abstain from taking any action if such action or abstention would, in the good faith determination of the Contractor, constitute a violation of any law or regulation to which Contractor is subject, including but not limited to laws and regulations requiring that Contractor conduct its operations in a safe and sound manner.

#### ARTICLE 22. MISCELLANEOUS

- A. Publicity. It is understood and agreed between the parties hereto that this Provider is funded by Miami-Dade County. Further, by the acceptance of these funds, the Provider agrees that events funded by this Agreement shall recognize and adequately reference the County as a funding source. The Provider shall ensure that all publicity, public relations, advertisements and signs recognizes and references the County for the support of all contracted activities. This is to include, but is not limited to, all posted signs, pamphlets, wall plaques, cornerstones, dedications, notices, flyers, brochures, news releases, media packages, promotions, and stationery. The use of the official County logo is permissible for the publicity purposes stated herein. Provider shall submit sample or mock up of such publicity or materials to the County for review and approval. The Provider shall ensure that all media representatives, when inquiring about the activities funded by this contract, are informed that the County is its funding source.
- B. Governing Law and Venue. This Agreement is made in the State of Florida and shall be governed according to the laws of the State of Florida. Venue for this Agreement shall be Miami-Dade County, Florida. The County and Provider are responsible for their own attorney fees.
- C. **Modifications.** Any alterations, variations, modifications, extensions, or waivers of provisions of this Agreement including, but not limited to, amount payable and effective term shall only be valid when they have been reduced to writing, duly approved and signed by both parties and attached to the original of this Agreement.

The County and Provider mutually agree that modification of the Scope of Service, schedule of payments, billing and cash payment procedures, set forth herein and other such revisions may be made as a written amendment to this Agreement executed by both the parties.

The Mayor or the Mayor's designee is authorized to make modifications to this Agreement as described herein on behalf of the County.

The Office of the Inspector General shall have the power to analyze the need for, and the reasonableness of proposed modifications to this Agreement.

- D. Counterparts. This Agreement is executed in three (3) counterparts, and each counterpart shall constitute an original of this Agreement.
- E. Headings, Use of Singular and Gender. Paragraph headings are for convenience only and are not intended to expand or restrict the scope or substance of the provisions of this Agreement. Wherever used herein, the singular shall include the plural and plural shall include the singular, and pronouns shall be read as masculine, feminine, or neuter as the context requires.
- F. Review of this Agreement. Each party hereto represents and warrants that they have consulted with their own attorney concerning and participated in the drafting of each of the terms contained in this Agreement. No inference, assumption, or presumption shall be drawn from the fact that one party or its attorney prepared this Agreement. It shall be conclusively presumed that each party participated in the preparation and drafting of this Agreement.
- G. Totality of Agreement / Severability of Provisions. This Agreement and Attachments, with it recitals on the first page of the Agreement and with its attachments as referenced below contain all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties:

# OVERVIEW OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS' DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAM

Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) serve the students of Metropolitan Miami-Dade County, which includes the City of Miami, 27 outlying municipalities, and a large unincorporated area. M-DCPS has a total population of approximately 345,000 students, served by approximately 20,322 full-time teachers. This places M-DCPS as the fourth largest school district in the United States, and the largest school district in Florida. To more efficiently serve the needs of the 392 schools, the district is divided into four administrative regions supervised by Regional Centers.

Currently, driver education is offered in the district's traditional senior high schools. Driver education is offered numerous periods per day, five days per week. Depending on the school site, these classes have the option of being offered in the afternoon, immediately following the conclusion of the regularly scheduled school day, in the evening, or on Saturdays each trimester. Private school students, as well as public school students, whose senior high schools do not offer driver education, may enroll in these classes at no cost. Driver education is offered both semesters of the regular school year as a one semester, elective course.

# DRIVER EDUCATION CLASSROOM CURRICULUM

I. Students will be taught a basic knowledge of a Highway Transportation System (HTS), its purpose, major elements, effectiveness, and the roles by various components in the system.

Specifically, they will be able to identify the three major elements of the Highway Transportation System, how the success of each of the three major elements is dependent upon the other two and how to identify these methods by which the Highway Transportation System's effectiveness can be measured. They will be able to define the sub-systems that have been established to manage the Highway Transportation System and their purpose. The students will learn the economic and social consequences resulting from breakdowns in the Highway Transportation System and the "multiple causes" theory of collisions as well as the rationale for using the term "collision" rather than "accident". Students will compare age group collision statistics and identify ways to improve the records for each grouping.

II. Students will be taught methods of basic control of the vehicle and be able to demonstrate this basic skill. Included will be exterior and interior pre-driving checks, control of motion and direction, and basic maneuvers.

Specifically, they will be taught to execute exterior and interior pre-driving checks and the steps a driver should take in starting the engine. They will learn the standard identity and location of each item found on the instrument panel and describe its function. This will include the function of each device used for safety, visibility, communication, and comfort in a standard passenger vehicle, correct procedures for starting the engine, placing the vehicle in motion, and stopping it safely will be taught. They will be taught the techniques of proper steering for forward and reverse driving. They will learn the steps for making correct lane changes, and how to make a right and left turn at an intersection. The steps used to park a vehicle parallel, angled, and perpendicular to the curb or road way, will be covered as well. Students will learn the advantages and disadvantages for selecting maneuvers and procedures used in reversing the direction of a vehicle.

III. Students will learn to understand, interpret and react properly when exposed to signs, signals, and pavement markings.

Specifically, students will learn to classify traffic signs into the categories of regulatory, warning, and information/guide as well as interpret and react properly when exposed to these traffic signs. They will be able to define the meaning of the different shapes, colors, and international symbols used to code traffic signs. The ability to describe the appropriate actions used to obey the legal and practical implications of regulatory and warning signs will be taught. They will learn to identify and describe traffic control signals that regulate traffic flows or

warn drivers and/or pedestrians of hazards and to identify and describe the system that controls traffic light changes. Students will be able to identify the types of pavement markings by color, configuration, and direction and their importance when planning one's actions.

IV. Students will learn to identify potential hazard that may happen in regard to each possible danger based on minimum risk, and demonstrate appropriate execution of these decisions.

Specifically, the definition of the term "hazard" as used in the Highway Transportation System will be taught. Students will learn the categories from which hazards are identified within the driving scene and learn the scanning techniques for identifying clues to potential hazards within the driving scene. Students will learn the skills to predict potential outcomes of hazards within the driving scene. They will learn the importance of making accurate decisions to minimize the risk of potential hazards. Students will learn the relationship between the physical process of executing the decision and the mental processes which preceded the action. They will learn the five possible actions a driver employs to execute decisions about changes in speed, lane position, and planned path of travel. Strategies used to implement the I.P.D.E. (identify, predict, decide, execute) process of defensive driving will be emphasized.

V. Students will be taught to understand the management of space requirements under all driving situations.

Specifically, they will learn about the relationship between the correct positioning of a vehicle and collision prevention. Discussions will be conducted regarding the techniques used to maintain a two-second interval of space between vehicles as well as situations when a two-second interval is not sufficient. Students will learn the disadvantages of following too closely as related to visibility, maneuverability, and stopping along with the actions that can be taken to reduce the possibilities of rear-end collisions. Students will learn the actions a driver can take to minimize the danger of encoming traffic and the conditions that may cause the encoming vehicle to cross the center line. Specific clues to look for when following vehicles that alert the driver to reduce speed and implement the LP.D.E. requirements for a safe following distance will be covered. The use of "compromising" as a strategy for maintaining lateral space will be reviewed as well.

VI. Students will learn procedures required to effectively control and take proper actions in emergency situations.

Specifically, they will learn the two sources of driving emergencies, the actions to take if any of the following occurs: (1) the brakes or the steering system should fall, (2) if forward vision becomes blocked, (3) if a tire has a blowout, (4) if the accelerator sticks, (5) if the vehicle catches fire, (6) if there is vehicle power fallure, (7) if experiencing loss of traction, (8) the recovery action to take if the vehicle runs off the road, (9) the actions a driver may take to avoid a head-on

crash and (10) how to avoid a side-impact collision and minimize the effects of a collision.

VII. Students will learn measures necessary to correct and minimize the effects of temporary or permanent physical defects or limitations.

Specifically, they will learn how temporary or permanent disabilities affect a person's abilities to perform the I.P.D.E. steps of the driving task, the visual abilities a driver must possess and how each applies to the various driving environments. Students will learn how a driver can compensate for impairments in visual acuity, peripheral vision, depth perception, color vision, glare recovery, and hearing. The characteristics of carbon monoxide and the ways carbon monoxide might enter a vehicle's driving compartment as well as symptoms and appropriate first aid regarding carbon monoxide polsoning will be covered.

VIII. Students will learn their legal and moral responsibilities at the scene of highway collisions.

Specifically, they will learn what Florida laws require of drivers involved in traffic collisions and the legal and moral responsibilities a person should assume at the scene of traffic collisions. Discussion will be centered on what actions may be used to assist injured victims at the scene of traffic collisions and the step-by-step procedures to follow at the scene of traffic collisions.

IX The student will learn how attitudes and emotions affect driving decisions.

Specifically, they will learn how emotions may affect a person's ability to perform each I.P.D.E. step of the driving task and the physical changes that may occur when a person is affected by strong emotions. The emotions that most often impair driving will be identified and how they can affect driving performance and a driver's decision-making regarding risk acceptance. Students will learn some techniques that can be used to cope with emotions while driving. They will learn how passenger emotional maturity may affect a driver and some techniques that may be used to assist the driver. A comparison of personality traits of drivers who have a collision history verses those free of violations will be discussed.

X. Students will learn the importance of vehicle maintenance that promotes safe and efficient operation.

Specifically, they will learn the meaning and importance of preventive maintenance for car owners and how to identify and explain the functions of the different systems of an automobile. The warning signs which indicate the need for repair, replacement, or maintenance of the different systems of a car will be identified. Students will learn the Florida laws regarding the responsibility of the motorist to keep their ear in a safe-driving condition and ways to find competent mechanics to repair and maintain the car. Driving practices that can help reduce the amount of fuel used per mile and information regarding the various types of tires, how to maintain them, and rules for replacing them will be discussed.

XI. Students will learn about their responsibility to comply with laws which apply to drivers as well as owners of motor vehicles.

Specifically, they will learn the primary purpose of the requirements of driver licensing, the procedures and requirements-for obtaining a restricted, regular, chauffeurs and motorcycle license in the State of Florida. The legal requirements for purchasing and selling a motor vehicle in Florida will be reviewed. Students will learn about the different types of vehicle insurance coverage and the Florida Financial Responsibility Law. Problems and responsibilities of vehicle ownership for a high school student will be discussed. Students will learn why traffic laws exist and what would happen if there were no traffic laws along with how the Florida point system for traffic law works. The relationship of natural laws and legislated laws regarding speed, following distance, and required vehicle equipment will be covered.

XII. Students will learn the principles and practices related to using a motor vehicle for a long trip.

They will learn about the important vehicle maintenance checks that should be executed along with the personal preparations that should be made prior to a long trip. They will learn what emergency equipment and supplies to take on a long trip. They will learn to use and to value a road map in trip planning. Factors to consider when selecting the safest, most convenient and least costly routes for short, long, and overnight trips will be covered. The proper way to load a car, truck, trailer, motorcycle, and other recreational vehicles along with the precautions a driver should take when towing a trailer will be discussed.

XIII. Students will learn the basic operation and interaction of motorcycles and other two wheeled vehicles on the Highway Transportation System.

Specifically, they will learn the dual responsibility of drivers and motorcyclists as they operate together in traffic and the procedures a cyclist should follow while learning to drive. They will learn the importance of wearing apparel and equipment that protect a cyclist and safety rules and procedures for motorcycle passengers. Students will also learn how both the driver and cyclist can use the I.P.D.E. process for defensive strategies and tactics in traffic. The Florida laws relating to motorcycles, motor-driven cycles, and their operators will be discussed.

XIV. Students will learn about specific decisions to be made when interacting with other users of the Highway Transportation System beyond just the automobile.

Specifically, they will learn about the characteristics and special problems caused by trains and other vehicles on fixed tracks or courses. Problems and actions necessary to interact with non-motorized vehicles and pedestrians will also be discussed. Students will learn about the problems unique to commercial carriers

and other vehicles of significant size and weight differences along with the action necessary to interact safely on the roadways.

XV. Students will learn about vehicle occupant restraints and other built-in safety-features and devices.

Specifically, they will learn the Florida Laws that pertain to vehicle occupant restraints and their advantages which justify the use of vehicle occupant restraints. They will learn correct use of vehicle occupant restraint devices for all age and size passengers. The "force of impact" and factors that affect the "force of impact" in a collision will be discussed. Students will learn about "car crash" and the "passenger crash." The relationship between the increase in speed and "force of impact" applied to the natural law of kinetic energy and its effects on vehicle size, injury and survival rates in crashes will be discussed.

XVI. Students will learn about the need for actively supporting traffic law enforcement agencies and assisting in the improvement of highway safety programs.

Specifically, they will identify ways to encourage and support legislative efforts that affect traffic law. The enforcement agencies, local, state, and national programs and organizations that can be used to enhance highway safety will be identified. Methods by which the media can be used to influence public support for law enforcement and highway safety programs will be discussed.

XVII. Students must successfully complete the Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) course component within the driver education curriculum as prescribed in section 322.095, F.S.

Specifically, the Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) provides instruction on the physiological and psychological consequences of abuse of alcohol and other drugs, the societal and economic costs of alcohol and drug abuse, the effects of alcohol and drug abuse on the driver of a motor vehicle and the laws of the State, relating to the operation of a motor vehicle.

Direct Costs: \$2,519,619.35

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# Personnel: Salaries and fringe benefits = \$2,473,691.96

The salary and fringes being charged are directly related to drivers' education instruction. Instruction is offered county-wide at various locations at the secondary and postsecondary levels providing certification in drug and alcohol abuse, driving theory, and practical driving experience for each student. There is no administrative cost included for each school site. One teacher and vehicle is used exclusively for disabled students and is ADA equipped. Attached is a breakdown of full time and part-time direct payroll costs.

Gasoline: \$4,901.57

Gasoline costs for the entire District is for the use of school owned vehicles identified specifically for the Drivers' Education programs. The vehicles are safety equipped and are used only for the Drivers' Education program.

Repairs: \$40,957.16

The vehicles in the Drivers' Education programs are maintained and repaired by the school system.

Tires:

\$ 68.66

Tires are inspected, repaired or replaced on an as needed basis to assure the safety of each trainee. Tires are purchased through the State of Florida bid process. Tires get some pretty tough use from driving around the range, hitting curbs, and vandalism. Tires are balanced when mounted to extend their life.

#### Summary:

The vehicles used in the Drivers' Education program are purchased, owned, insured, repaired, and maintained by Miami-Dade County Public Schools and are specifically designated for the Drivers' Education programs. Each vehicle in use is safety inspected annually and repaired as needed to assure safe operation for trainees. Vehicles are housed in safety cages located on the Drivers' Education range at each school to provide security and to dissuade vandalism. No cost is included for facilities, utilities, the use or depreciation of the vehicles, upkeep of driving range, text books, audio visual, tests, materials, supplies, security, custodial, nor administrators at the school sites.

# OVERVIEW OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS' DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAM

Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) serve the students of Metropolitan Miami-Dade County, which includes the City of Miami, 27 outlying municipalities, and a large unincorporated area. M-DCPS has a total population of over 353,000 students. This places M-DCPS as the fourth largest school district in the United States, and the largest school district in Florida. To more efficiently serve the needs of its 435 schools, the district is divided into four administrative regions supervised by Regional Centers.

Currently, driver education is offered in the district's traditional senior high schools. Driver education is offered numerous periods per day, five days per week. Depending on the school site, these classes have the option of being offered in the afternoon, immediately following the conclusion of the regularly scheduled school day, in the evening, or on Saturdays each trimester. Private school students, as well as public school students, whose senior high schools do not offer driver education, may enroll in these classes at no cost. Driver education is offered both semesters of the regular school year as a one semester, elective course.

#### DRIVER EDUCATION CLASSROOM CURRICULUM

I. Students will be taught a basic knowledge of a Highway Transportation System (HTS), its purpose, major elements, effectiveness, and the roles by various components in the system.

Specifically, they will be able to identify the three major elements of the Highway Transportation System, how the success of each of the three major elements is dependent upon the other two and how to identify these methods by which the Highway Transportation System's effectiveness can be measured. They will be able to define the sub-systems that have been established to manage the Highway Transportation System and their purpose. The students will learn the economic and social consequences resulting from breakdowns in the Highway Transportation System and the "multiple causes" theory of collisions as well as the rationale for using the term "collision" rather than "accident". Students will compare age group collision statistics and identify ways to improve the records for each grouping.

II. Students will be taught methods of basic control of the vehicle and be able to demonstrate this basic skill. Included will be exterior and interior pre-driving checks, control of motion and direction, and basic maneuvers.

Specifically, they will be taught to execute exterior and interior pre-driving checks and the steps a driver should take in starting the engine. They will learn the standard identity and location of each item found on the instrument panel and describe its function. This will include the function of each device used for safety, visibility, communication, and comfort in a standard passenger vehicle, correct procedures for starting the engine, placing the vehicle in motion, and stopping it safely will be taught. They will be taught the techniques of proper steering for forward and reverse driving. They will learn the steps for making correct lane changes, and how to make a right and left turn at an intersection. The steps used to park a vehicle parallel, angled, and perpendicular to the curb or road way, will be covered as well. Students will learn the advantages and disadvantages for selecting maneuvers and procedures used in reversing the direction of a vehicle.

III. Students will learn to understand, interpret and react properly when exposed to signs, signals, and pavement markings.

Specifically, students will learn to classify traffic signs into the categories of regulatory, warning, and information/guide as well as interpret and react properly when exposed to these traffic signs. They will be able to define the meaning of the different shapes, colors, and international symbols used to code traffic signs. The ability to describe the appropriate actions used to obey the legal and practical implications of regulatory and warning signs will be taught. They will learn to identify and describe traffic control signals that regulate traffic flows or

warn drivers and/or pedestrians of hazards and to identify and describe the system that controls traffic light changes. Students will be able to identify the types of pavement markings by color, configuration, and direction and their importance when planning one's actions.

IV. Students will learn to identify potential hazard that may happen in regard to each possible danger based on minimum risk, and demonstrate appropriate execution of these decisions.

Students will learn the categories from which hazards are <u>identified</u> within the driving scene and learn the scanning techniques for <u>identifying</u> clues to potential hazards within the driving scene. Students will learn the skills to <u>predict</u> potential outcomes of hazards within the driving scene. They will learn the importance of making accurate decisions to minimize the risk of potential hazards. Students will learn the relationship between the physical process of <u>executing</u> the decision and the mental processes which preceded the action. They will learn the five possible actions a driver employs to <u>execute</u> decisions about changes in speed, lane position, and planned path of travel. Strategies used to implement the I.P.D.E. (identify, predict, decide, execute) process of defensive driving will be emphasized.

V. Students will be taught to understand the management of space requirements under all driving situations.

Specifically, they will learn about the relationship between the correct positioning of a vehicle and collision prevention. Discussions will be conducted regarding the techniques used to maintain a two-second interval of space between vehicles as well as situations when a two-second interval is not sufficient. Students will learn the disadvantages of following too closely as related to visibility, maneuverability, and stopping along with the actions that can be taken to reduce the possibilities of rear-end collisions. Students will learn the actions a driver can take to minimize the danger of oncoming traffic and the conditions that may cause the oncoming vehicle to cross the center line. Specific clues to look for when following vehicles that alert the driver to reduce speed and implement the I.P.D.E. requirements for a safe following distance will be covered. The use of "compromising" as a strategy for maintaining lateral space will be reviewed as well.

VI. Students will learn procedures required to effectively control and take proper actions in emergency situations.

Specifically, they will learn the two sources of driving emergencies, the actions to take if any of the following occurs: (1) the brakes or the steering system should fail, (2) if forward vision becomes blocked, (3) if a tire has a blowout, (4) if the accelerator sticks, (5) if the vehicle catches fire, (6) if there is vehicle power failure, (7) if experiencing loss of traction, (8) the recovery action to take if the vehicle runs off the road, (9) the actions a driver may take to avoid a head-on

crash and (10) how to avoid a side-impact collision and minimize the effects of a collision.

VII. Students will learn measures necessary to correct and minimize the effects of temporary or permanent physical defects or limitations.

Specifically, they will learn how temporary or permanent disabilities affect a person's abilities to perform the I.P.D.E. steps of the driving task, the visual abilities a driver must possess and how each applies to the various driving environments. Students will learn how a driver can compensate for impairments in visual acuity, peripheral vision, depth perception, color vision, glare recovery, and hearing. The characteristics of carbon monoxide and the ways carbon monoxide might enter a vehicle's driving compartment as well as symptoms and appropriate first aid regarding carbon monoxide poisoning will be covered.

VIII. Students will learn their legal and moral responsibilities at the scene of highway collisions.

Specifically, they will learn what Florida laws require of drivers involved in traffic collisions and the legal and moral responsibilities a person should assume at the scene of traffic collisions. Discussion will be centered on what actions may be used to assist injured victims at the scene of traffic collisions and the step-by-step procedures to follow at the scene of traffic collisions.

IX The student will learn how attitudes and emotions affect driving decisions.

Specifically, they will learn how emotions may affect a person's ability to perform each I.P.D.E. step of the driving task and the physical changes that may occur when a person is affected by strong emotions. The emotions that most often impair driving will be identified and how they can affect driving performance and a driver's decision-making regarding risk acceptance. They will learn how passenger emotional maturity may affect a driver and some techniques that may be used to assist the driver. A comparison of personality traits of drivers who have a collision history verses those free of violations will be discussed.

Specifically, they will learn the meaning and importance of preventive maintenance for car owners and how to identify and explain the functions of the different systems of an automobile. The warning signs which indicate the need for repair, replacement, or maintenance of the different systems of a car will be identified. Students will learn the Florida laws regarding the responsibility of the motorist to keep their car in a safe-driving condition and ways to find competent mechanics to repair and maintain the car. Driving practices that can help reduce the amount of fuel used per mile and information regarding the various types of tires, how to maintain them, and rules for replacing them will be discussed.

XI. Students will learn about their responsibility to comply with laws which apply to drivers as well as owners of motor vehicles.

Specifically, they will learn the primary purpose of the requirements of driver licensing, the procedures and requirements for obtaining a restricted, regular, chauffeurs and motorcycle license in the State of Florida. The legal requirements for purchasing and selling a motor vehicle in Florida will be reviewed. Students will learn about the different types of vehicle insurance coverage and the Florida Financial Responsibility Law. Problems and responsibilities of vehicle ownership for a high school student will be discussed. Students will learn why traffic laws exist and what would happen if there were no traffic laws along with how the Florida point system for traffic law works. The relationship of natural laws and legislated laws regarding speed, following distance, and required vehicle equipment will be covered.

XII. Students will learn the principles and practices related to using a motor vehicle for a long trip.

They will learn about the important vehicle maintenance checks that should be executed along with the personal preparations that should be made prior to a long trip. They will learn what emergency equipment and supplies to take on a long trip. They will learn to use and to value a road map in trip planning. Factors to consider when selecting the safest, most convenient and least costly routes for short, long, and overnight trips will be covered. The proper way to load a car, truck, trailer, motorcycle, and other recreational vehicles along with the precautions a driver should take when towing a trailer will be discussed.

XIII. Students will learn the basic operation and interaction of motorcycles and other two wheeled vehicles on the Highway Transportation System.

Specifically, they will learn the dual responsibility of drivers and motorcyclists as they operate together in traffic and the procedures a cyclist should follow while learning to drive. They will learn the importance of wearing apparel and equipment that protect a cyclist and safety rules and procedures for motorcycle passengers. Students will also learn how both the driver and cyclist can use the I.P.D.E. process for defensive strategies and tactics in traffic. The Florida laws relating to motorcycles, motor-driven cycles, and their operators will be discussed.

XIV. Students will learn about specific decisions to be made when interacting with other users of the Highway Transportation System beyond just the automobile.

Specifically, they will learn about the characteristics and special problems caused by trains and other vehicles on fixed tracks or courses. Problems and actions necessary to interact with non-motorized vehicles and pedestrians will also be discussed. Students will learn about the problems unique to commercial carriers

and other vehicles of significant size and weight differences along with the action necessary to interact safely on the roadways.

XV. Students will learn about vehicle occupant restraints and other built-in safety-features and devices.

Specifically, they will learn the Florida Laws that pertain to vehicle occupant restraints and their advantages which justify the use of vehicle occupant restraints. They will learn correct use of vehicle occupant restraint devices for all age and size passengers. The "force of impact" and factors that affect the "force of impact" in a collision will be discussed. Students will learn about "car crash" and the "passenger crash." XVII. Students must successfully complete the Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) course component within the driver education curriculum as prescribed in section 322,095, F.S.

Specifically, the Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) provides instruction on the physiological and psychological consequences of abuse of alcohol and other drugs, the societal and economic costs of alcohol and drug abuse, the effects of alcohol and drug abuse on the driver of a motor vehicle and the laws of the State, relating to the operation of a motor vehicle.

## OVERVIEW OF MIAMI-DADE COUNTY PUBLIC SCHOOLS' DRIVER EDUCATION PROGRAM

Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) serve the students of Metropolitan Miami-Dade County, which includes the City of Miami, 34 municipalities, and a large unincorporated area. M-DCPS has a total population of over 355,000 students. This places M-DCPS as the fourth largest school district in the United States, and the largest school district in Florida. To more efficiently serve the needs of its over 450 schools, the district is divided into three administrative regions supervised by Regional Centers.

Currently, driver education is offered in the district's traditional senior high schools. Driver education is offered numerous periods per day, five days per week. Depending on the school site, these classes have the option of being offered in the afternoon, immediately following the conclusion of the regularly scheduled school day, in the evening, or on Saturdays each trimester. Private school students, as well as public school students, whose senior high schools do not offer driver education, may enroll in these classes at no cost. Driver education is offered both semesters of the regular school year as a one semester, elective course.

For fiscal year 2015-2016, there were 2,314 students enrolled in the Drivers' Ed Program and the classes were offered at the schools listed below:

#### DRIVER EDUCATION CLASSROOM CURRICULUM

I. Students will be taught a basic knowledge of a Highway Transportation System (HTS), its purpose, major elements, effectiveness, and the roles by various components in the system.

Specifically, they will be able to identify the three major elements of the Highway Transportation System, how the success of each of the three major elements is dependent upon the other two and how to identify these methods by which the Highway Transportation System's effectiveness can be measured. They will be able to define the sub-systems that have been established to manage the Highway Transportation System and their purpose. The students will learn the economic and social consequences resulting from breakdowns in the Highway Transportation System and the "multiple causes" theory of collisions as well as the rationale for using the term "collision" rather than "accident". Students will compare age group collision statistics and identify ways to improve the records for each grouping.

II. Students will be taught methods of basic control of the vehicle and be able to demonstrate this basic skill. Included will be exterior and interior pre-driving checks, control of motion and direction, and basic maneuvers.

Specifically, they will be taught to execute exterior and interior pre-driving checks and the steps a driver should take in starting the engine. They will learn the standard identity and location of each item found on the instrument panel and describe its function. This will include the function of each device used for safety, visibility, communication, and comfort in a standard passenger vehicle, correct procedures for starting the engine, placing the vehicle in motion, and stopping it safely will be taught. They will be taught the techniques of proper steering for forward and reverse driving. They will learn the steps for making correct lane changes, and how to make a right and left turn at an intersection. The steps used to park a vehicle parallel, angled, and perpendicular to the curb or road way, will be covered as well. Students will learn the advantages and disadvantages for selecting maneuvers and procedures used in reversing the direction of a vehicle.

III. Students will learn to understand, interpret and react properly when exposed to signs, signals, and pavement markings.

Specifically, students will learn to classify traffic signs into the categories of regulatory, warning, and information/guide as well as interpret and react properly when exposed to these traffic signs. They will be able to define the meaning of the different shapes, colors, and international symbols used to code traffic signs. The ability to describe the appropriate actions used to obey the legal and practical implications of regulatory and warning signs will be taught. They will learn to identify and describe traffic control signals that regulate traffic flows or

warn drivers and/or pedestrians of hazards and to identify and describe the system that controls traffic light changes. Students will be able to identify the types of pavement markings by color, configuration, and direction and their importance when planning one's actions.

IV. Students will learn to identify potential hazard that may happen in regard to each possible danger based on minimum risk, and demonstrate appropriate execution of these decisions.

Specifically, the definition of the term "hazard" as used in the Highway Transportation System will be taught. Students will learn the categories from which hazards are <u>identified</u> within the driving scene and learn the scanning techniques for <u>identifying</u> clues to potential hazards within the driving scene. Students will learn the skills to <u>predict</u> potential outcomes of hazards within the driving scene. They will learn the importance of making accurate decisions to minimize the risk of potential hazards. Students will learn the relationship between the physical process of <u>executing</u> the decision and the mental processes which preceded the action. They will learn the five possible actions a driver employs to <u>execute</u> decisions about changes in speed, lane position, and planned path of travel. Strategies used to implement the I.P.D.E. (identify, predict, decide, execute) process of defensive driving will be emphasized.

V. Students will be taught to understand the management of space requirements under all driving situations.

Specifically, they will learn about the relationship between the correct positioning of a vehicle and collision prevention. Discussions will be conducted regarding the techniques used to maintain a two-second interval of space between vehicles as well as situations when a two-second interval is not sufficient. Students will learn the disadvantages of following too closely as related to visibility, maneuverability, and stopping along with the actions that can be taken to reduce the possibilities of rear-end collisions. Students will learn the actions a driver can take to minimize the danger of oncoming traffic and the conditions that may cause the oncoming vehicle to cross the center line. Specific clues to look for when following vehicles that alert the driver to reduce speed and implement the I.P.D.E. requirements for a safe following distance will be covered. The use of "compromising" as a strategy for maintaining lateral space will be reviewed as well.

VI. Students will learn procedures required to effectively control and take proper actions in emergency situations.

Specifically, they will learn the two sources of driving emergencies, the actions to take if any of the following occurs: (1) the brakes or the steering system should fail, (2) if forward vision becomes blocked, (3) if a tire has a blowout, (4) if the accelerator sticks, (5) if the vehicle catches fire, (6) if there is vehicle power failure, (7) if experiencing loss of traction, (8) the recovery action to take if the vehicle runs off the road, (9) the actions a driver may take to avoid a head-on

crash and (10) how to avoid a side-impact collision and minimize the effects of a collision.

VII. Students will learn measures necessary to correct and minimize the effects of temporary or permanent physical defects or limitations.

Specifically, they will learn how temporary or permanent disabilities affect a person's abilities to perform the I.P.D.E. steps of the driving task, the visual abilities a driver must possess and how each applies to the various driving environments. Students will learn how a driver can compensate for impairments in visual acuity, peripheral vision, depth perception, color vision, glare recovery, and hearing. The characteristics of carbon monoxide and the ways carbon monoxide might enter a vehicle's driving compartment as well as symptoms and appropriate first aid regarding carbon monoxide poisoning will be covered.

VIII. Students will learn their legal and moral responsibilities at the scene of highway collisions.

Specifically, they will learn what Florida laws require of drivers involved in traffic collisions and the legal and moral responsibilities a person should assume at the scene of traffic collisions. Discussion will be centered on what actions may be used to assist injured victims at the scene of traffic collisions and the step-by-step procedures to follow at the scene of traffic collisions.

IX The student will learn how attitudes and emotions affect driving decisions.

Specifically, they will learn how emotions may affect a person's ability to perform each I.P.D.E. step of the driving task and the physical changes that may occur when a person is affected by strong emotions. The emotions that most often impair driving will be identified and how they can affect driving performance and a driver's decision-making regarding risk acceptance. Students will learn some techniques that can be used to cope with emotions while driving. They will learn how passenger emotional maturity may affect a driver and some techniques that may be used to assist the driver. A comparison of personality traits of drivers who have a collision history verses those free of violations will be discussed.

X. Students will learn the importance of vehicle maintenance that promotes safe and efficient operation.

Specifically, they will learn the meaning and importance of preventive maintenance for car owners and how to identify and explain the functions of the different systems of an automobile. The warning signs which indicate the need for repair, replacement, or maintenance of the different systems of a car will be identified. Students will learn the Florida laws regarding the responsibility of the motorist to keep their car in a safe-driving condition and ways to find competent mechanics to repair and maintain the car. Driving practices that can help reduce the amount of fuel used per mile and information regarding the various types of tires, how to maintain them, and rules for replacing them will be discussed.

XI. Students will learn about their responsibility to comply with laws which apply to drivers as well as owners of motor vehicles.

Specifically, they will learn the primary purpose of the requirements of driver licensing, the procedures and requirements for obtaining a restricted, regular, chauffeurs and motorcycle license in the State of Florida. The legal requirements for purchasing and selling a motor vehicle in Florida will be reviewed. Students will learn about the different types of vehicle insurance coverage and the Florida Financial Responsibility Law. Problems and responsibilities of vehicle ownership for a high school student will be discussed. Students will learn why traffic laws exist and what would happen if there were no traffic laws along with how the Florida point system for traffic law works. The relationship of natural laws and legislated laws regarding speed, following distance, and required vehicle equipment will be covered.

XII. Students will learn the principles and practices related to using a motor vehicle for a long trip.

They will learn about the important vehicle maintenance checks that should be executed along with the personal preparations that should be made prior to a long trip. They will learn what emergency equipment and supplies to take on a long trip. They will learn to use and to value a road map in trip planning. Factors to consider when selecting the safest, most convenient and least costly routes for short, long, and overnight trips will be covered. The proper way to load a car, truck, trailer, motorcycle, and other recreational vehicles along with the precautions a driver should take when towing a trailer will be discussed.

XIII. Students will learn the basic operation and interaction of motorcycles and other two wheeled vehicles on the Highway Transportation System.

Specifically, they will learn the dual responsibility of drivers and motorcyclists as they operate together in traffic and the procedures a cyclist should follow while learning to drive. They will learn the importance of wearing apparel and equipment that protect a cyclist and safety rules and procedures for motorcycle passengers. Students will also learn how both the driver and cyclist can use the I.P.D.E. process for defensive strategies and tactics in traffic. The Florida laws relating to motorcycles, motor-driven cycles, and their operators will be discussed.

XIV. Students will learn about specific decisions to be made when interacting with other users of the Highway Transportation System beyond just the automobile.

Specifically, they will learn about the characteristics and special problems caused by trains and other vehicles on fixed tracks or courses. Problems and actions necessary to interact with non-motorized vehicles and pedestrians will also be discussed. Students will learn about the problems unique to commercial carriers

and other vehicles of significant size and weight differences along with the action necessary to interact safely on the roadways.

XV. Students will learn about vehicle occupant restraints and other built-in safety-features and devices.

Specifically, they will learn the Florida Laws that pertain to vehicle occupant restraints and their advantages which justify the use of vehicle occupant restraints. They will learn correct use of vehicle occupant restraint devices for all age and size passengers. The "force of impact" and factors that affect the "force of impact" in a collision will be discussed. Students will learn about "car crash" and the "passenger crash." The relationship between the increase in speed and "force of impact" applied to the natural law of kinetic energy and its effects on vehicle size, injury and survival rates in crashes will be discussed.

XVI. Students will learn about the need for actively supporting traffic law enforcement agencies and assisting in the improvement of highway safety programs.

Specifically, they will identify ways to encourage and support legislative efforts that affect traffic law. The enforcement agencies, local, state, and national programs and organizations that can be used to enhance highway safety will be identified. Methods by which the media can be used to influence public support for law enforcement and highway safety programs will be discussed.

XVII. Students must successfully complete the Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) course component within the driver education curriculum as prescribed in section 322.095, F.S.

Specifically, the Traffic Law and Substance Abuse Education (TLSAE) provides instruction on the physiological and psychological consequences of abuse of alcohol and other drugs, the societal and economic costs of alcohol and drug abuse, the effects of alcohol and drug abuse on the driver of a motor vehicle and the laws of the State, relating to the operation of a motor vehicle.

Interlocal Agreement in the amount of \$2,519,619.35 between The Mianti-Dade County

School Board and Miami-Dade County for the provision of Drivers' Education

Recommendation
It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve the attached Interlocal Agreement between the County and the Miami-Dade County School Board (School Board) for the provision of Drivers' Education by the School Board in the amount of \$2,519,619.35. This amount will be paid from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund (Trust Fund) available for the period of October 1, 2011 to September 30, 2012, and provides for payment in arrears for services rendered during that period. The significant increase in the amount requested from the previous year (which was \$388,095.00) is due to the School Board's decision to again provide Driver's Education programs in high schools as opposed to just their adult education facilities. Funding covers all costs associated with providing classroom and behind the wheel instruction to students at thirty-six public high schools throughout the County.

Scope
The impact of this item is countywide in nature as Driver's Education programs are provided in public schools throughout the County.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source
There is no fiscal impact to the County with the approval of this item,

Pursuant to the Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act, 318,1215, Florida Statutes, effective Cotober 1, 2002, the Board approved Ordinance No. 02-167 on September 24, 2002, oreating the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund. The Ordinance also required the Clerk of the Court to collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty to be used to fund traffic education programs, and directed the Administration to develop selection procedures for adoption by the Board for the award of grants to Driver Education Programs.

Track Record/Monitor.

Pursuant to resolutions R-618-03 and R-864-04, the Board approved selection procedures, including criteria, for the distribution of grants from the Trust Fund. To date, the School Board has been the only recipient of funding from the Trust Fund since FY 2003-2004. The Office of Management and Budget, Grants Coordination (OMB-GC) will be responsible for monitoring this Interlocal Agreement.

Background
The selection procedures for the Trust Fund require the County to advertise the availability of Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund grants and request letters of interest from qualified organizations. The adopted criteria require the following:

- grant funds support driver's education programs offered by a public school system or nonprofit private school;
- private driving schools established principally for the purpose of driver education are not eligible; curriculum must include behind the wheel experience;
- driver's education must be offered to private as well as public school students;
- grantee must agree to provide appropriate accountability and reporting procedures; and
- funds may not be used for administrative/overhead expenses.

The adopted procedures further require that if only one letter of interest from a qualified organization is received, then the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee will negotiate an agreement and submit it to the Board for approval. For this cycle, the School Board was the only eligible organization to submit a letter of interest.

### Miami-Dade County Public Schools Drivers Education Training Program 2012 – 2013 Line Item Budget Justification

Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) serve the students of Metropolitan Miami-Dade County, which includes the City of Miami, 27 outlying municipalities, and a large unincorporated area. M-DCPS has a total population of approximately 353,000 students. This places M-DCPS as the fourth largest school district in the United States, and the largest school district in Florida. To more efficiently serve the needs of the 435 schools, the district is divided into four administrative regions supervised by Regional Centers.

Currently, driver education is offered in the district's traditional senior high schools. Driver education is offered numerous periods per day, five days per week. Depending on the school site, these classes have the option of being offered in the afternoon, immediately following the conclusion of the regularly scheduled school day, in the evening, or on Saturdays each trimester. Private school students, as well as public school students, whose senior high schools do not offer driver education, may enroll in these classes at no cost. Driver education is offered both semesters of the regular school year as a one semester, elective course.

Direct Costs: \$3,170,462.62

Personnel: Salaries and fringe benefits = \$3,158,901.92

The salary and fringes being charged are directly related to drivers' education instruction. Instruction is offered county-wide at various locations at the secondary and postsecondary levels providing certification in drug and alcohol abuse, driving theory, and practical driving experience for each student. There is no administrative cost included for each school site. One teacher and vehicle is used exclusively for disabled students and is ADA equipped. Attached is a breakdown of full time and part-time direct payroll costs.

Gasoline: \$4,255.97

Gasoline costs for the entire District is for the use of school owned vehicles identified specifically for the Drivers' Education programs. The vehicles are safety equipped and are used only for the Drivers' Education program.

Repairs: \$7,304.73

The vehicles in the Drivers' Education programs are maintained and repaired by the school system.

Summary:

The vehicles used in the Drivers' Education program are purchased, owned, insured, repaired, and maintained by Miami-Dade County Public Schools and are specifically designated for the Drivers' Education programs. Each vehicle in use is safety inspected annually and repaired as needed to assure safe operation for trainees. Vehicles are housed in safety cages located on the Drivers' Education range at each school to provide security and to dissuade vandalism. No cost is included for facilities, utilities, the use or depreciation of the vehicles, upkeep of driving range, text books, audio visual, tests, materials, supplies, security, custodial, nor administrators at the school sites.

Total award: \$3,170,462.62

Total number of students enrolled in Driver Education courses for fiscal year 2012/2013 = 1,689

Total number of hours of Drivers Education provided for fiscal year 2012/2013 = 167,541



Interlocal Agreement in the Amount of \$2,439,579.68 Between the Miami-Dade

County School Board and Miami-Dade County for the Provision of Drivers' Education

Recommendation

It is recommended that the Board of County Commissioners (Board) approve the attached FY 2014-15 Interlocal Agreement between Miami-Dade County (County) and the Miami-Dade County School Board (School Board) for the provision of Drivers' Education by the School Board in the amount of \$2,439,579.68. This amount will be paid from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund (Trust Fund) and provides for payment in arrears for services rendered from October 1, 2013 to September 30, 2014.

#### Scope

The impact of this item is countywide in nature as Driver's Education programs are provided in public schools throughout the County.

**Delegation of Authority** 

With the approval of this item, the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee has the authority to execute this interlocal agreement on behalf of the County and to exercise any and all other rights conferred therein, including, but not limited to, termination and modification provisions.

Fiscal Impact/Funding Source

There is a fiscal impact in the amount of \$2,439,579,68 to the County's Driver Education Safety Trust Fund with the approval of this item. There is no impact to the County's General Fund. Pursuant to the Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act, 318.1215, Florida Statutes, effective October 1, 2002, the Board approved Ordinance No. 02-167, creating the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund. The Ordinance also required the Clerk of the Court to collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty to be used to fund traffic education programs, and directed the Administration to develop selection procedures for adoption by the Board for the award of grants to Driver Education Programs. These funds may only be used to provide financial assistance to driver education programs in the public and non-public schools by paying direct educational expenses.

Track Record/Monitor

Pursuant to Resolutions R-618-03 and R-864-04, the Board approved selection procedures, including criteria, for the distribution of grants from the Trust Fund. To date, the School Board has been the only recipient of funding from the Trust Fund since FY 2003-04. Jennifer Moon, Director of the Office of Management and Budget will be responsible for monitoring this Interlocal Agreement.

Background

The selection procedures for the Trust Fund require the County to advertise the availability of Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund grants and request letters of interest from qualified organizations.

The adopted criteria require the following:

- grant funds support driver's education programs offered by a public school system or nonprofit private school;
- private driving schools established principally for the purpose of driver education are not eligible;
- curriculum must include behind the wheel experience;
- driver's education must be offered to private as well as public school students;
- · grantee must agree to provide appropriate accountability and reporting procedures; and
- · funds may not be used for administrative/overhead expenses.

The adopted procedures require that, if only one (1) letter of interest from a qualified organization is received, then the County Mayor or the County Mayor's designee will negotiate an agreement and submit it to the Board for approval. For this cycle, the School Board was the only eligible organization to submit a letter of interest.

FY 2014 - 2015 Driver's Education Contract

**AGREEMENT** 

This Agreement made and entered into as of this \_\_\_\_\_\_ day of, \_\_\_\_\_. 20\_6, by and between Miami-Dade County, a political subdivision of the State of Florida (hereinafter referred to as "County"), having its principal office at 111 N.W. 1<sup>st</sup> Street, 22<sup>ND</sup> Floor, Miami, Florida 33128 and the School Board of Miami-Dade County, Florida, hereinafter referred to as the "School Board", having its principal office at 1450 NE 2<sup>nd</sup> Avenue, Miami, Florida 33132, states conditions and covenants for the rendering of Driver's Education services (hereinafter referred to as "Services") for the County.

WHEREAS, Section 318.1215, Florida Statutes, effective at the time Ordinance No. 02-167 was adopted, known as the "Dori Slosberg Driver Education Safety Act" authorized the County to enact an ordinance requiring the clerk of the court to collect an additional \$3.00 with each civil traffic penalty to be used to fund traffic education programs in public and non-public schools; (the "Funds"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Ordinance No. 02-167, the Board of County Commissioners (the "Board") established the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund and directed the County Manager to develop selection procedures for adoption by the Board for the award of grants to Driver Education Programs; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Resolution R-618-03 and R-864-04, the Board approved selection procedures for the distribution of funds to driver education programs from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund; and

WHEREAS, the County has allocated funds from the Driver's Education Safety Trust Fund to the School Board for the provision of Driver's Education.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants recorded herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

#### ARTICLE 1. DEFINITIONS

The following words and expressions used in this Agreement shall be construed as follows, except when it is clear from the context that another meaning is intended:

- a) The words "Agreement" "Contract" or "Contract Documents" shall mean collectively these terms and conditions, the Scope of Services (Attachment A) and the Budget Documents (Attachment B) and all other attachments hereto, as well as all amendments or budget revisions issued hereto.
- b) The words "Contract Manager" shall mean Miami-Dade County's Director of the Office of Management and Budget ("OMB") or the Director's designee, or the duly authorized representative designated to manage the Contract.
- The word "Days" shall mean Calendar Days, unless otherwise specifically noted.

#### Miami-Dade County Public Schools Drivers Education Training Program 2011 – 2012 Line Item Budget Justification

Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) serve the students of Metropolitan Miami-Dade County, which includes the City of Miami, 27 outlying municipalities, and a large unincorporated area. M-DCPS has a total population of approximately 345,000 students, served by approximately 20,322 full-time teachers. This places M-DCPS as the fourth largest school district in the United States, and the largest school district in Florida. To more efficiently serve the needs of the 392 schools, the district is divided into four administrative regions supervised by Regional Centers.

Currently, driver education is offered in the district's traditional senior high schools. Driver education is offered numerous periods per day, five days per week. Depending on the school site, these classes have the option of being offered in the afternoon, immediately following the conclusion of the regularly scheduled school day, in the evening, or on Saturdays each trimester. Private school students, as well as public school students, whose senior high schools do not offer driver education, may enroll in these classes at no cost. Driver education is offered both semesters of the regular school year as a one semester, elective course.

Direct Costs: \$2,519,619.35

#### Personnel: Salaries and fringe benefits = \$2,473,691.96

The salary and fringes being charged are directly related to drivers' education instruction. Instruction is offered county-wide at various locations at the secondary and postsecondary levels providing certification in drug and alcohol abuse, driving theory, and practical driving experience for each student. There is no administrative cost included for each school site. One teacher and vehicle is used exclusively for disabled students and is ADA equipped. Attached is a breakdown of full time and part-time direct payroll costs.

Gasoline: \$4,901.57

Gasoline costs for the entire District is for the use of school owned vehicles identified specifically for the Drivers' Education programs. The vehicles are safety equipped and are used only for the Drivers' Education program.

Repairs: \$40,957.16

The vehicles in the Drivers' Education programs are maintained and repaired by the school system.

Tires: \$ 68.66

Tires are inspected, repaired or replaced on an as needed basis to assure the safety of each trainee. Tires are purchased through the State of Florida bid process. Tires get some pretty tough use from driving around the range, hitting curbs, and vandalism. Tires are balanced when mounted to extend their life.

Summary:

The vehicles used in the Drivers' Education program are purchased, owned, insured, repaired, and maintained by Miami-Dade County Public Schools and are specifically designated for the Drivers' Education programs. Each vehicle in use is safety inspected annually and repaired as needed to assure safe operation for trainees. Vehicles are housed in safety cages located on the Drivers' Education range at each school to provide security and to dissuade vandalism. No cost is included for facilities, utilities, the use or depreciation of the vehicles, upkeep of driving range, text books, audio visual, tests, materials, supplies, security, custodial, nor administrators at the school sites.




